Eight Fishermen Are Held for Violation

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 21. (AP)—Eight fishermen, alleged to have violated regulations against snagging fish with hooks, were under arrest today as a result of a raid last night by E. P. Averill, state game warden and night officer, near Oregon City. Four boats and a quantity of fishing tackle were seized by the officers. Averill charged that he had witnessed through binoculars some of the fishermen snagging salmon with hooks, and that four of the fish, showing marks of hooks were seized. Complaints have been issued against two other men who are alleged to have escaped.

Deposed President of China Now in Tien Tsin

TIENTSIN, Apr. 21. (AP)—Tsun Chi-Lun, deposed chief executive of China, accompanied by numerous adherents, arrived today from Peking by automobile. He will reside temporarily in the home of former war minister Wu Ting-Fan in the Japanese concession. (Chong Hsueh-Liang, son of Manchuria's dictator, Chang Tso-Lin, left for Peking today with five trainloads of Manchurian troops. It was learned that the young general visited Peking secretly Sunday. The present visit is described as a triumphal entry.

Pescawha Rum Runners Sentenced; May Appeal

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 21. (AP)—Captain Robert Pamphlet, master of the Canadian schooner Pescawha, which was seized as a rum runner off the Washington coast in February, 1924, was sentenced in federal court today to two years in the penitentiary and fined \$5,000. Jacob Wolfe, who was convicted along with Captain Pamphlet, was sentenced to two years and fined \$3,000. Wolfe was convicted of being the head of a gang of land rum runners who cooperated with the Pescawha. Frank Bates, Wolfe's second in command, was sentenced to 15 months and fined \$5,000.

Ed Cyr, Formerly of La Grande, in Robbery

Ed Cyr, formerly a garage man of this city but now located at Long Beach, Cal., was held up by an armed bandit and robbed of one dollar which was returned to him, according to an item in the Long Beach Telegram.

Mr. Cyr was seated in his garage when he heard a noise at the office window and found himself facing a revolver. The intruder entered, forcing Cyr to accompany him to the rear of the place, when a search revealed only one dollar on Cyr's person, \$35 in change being hidden in the building. Cyr told the robber this was all the money he had, adding that he also had a large family. "If that's the case you may need this," the robber said and handed back the dollar.

He ordered Cyr to accompany him to two adjoining places, but at automobile drove up and Cyr managed to get on the other side of the car and ran. The robber followed, but stumbled over a plank and fell. He disappeared as Cyr spread the alarm.

Eugene Business Men Face Liquor Charges

EUGENE, Ore., Apr. 21. (AP)—Sidney R. Allen, druggist, and Howard M. Brownell, attorney, both prominent in Eugene, were locked up in the Lane county jail last night on charges involving liquor law infractions, following the wreck of three automobiles on the highway north of here. A touring car with a California license was struck by the Allen car, according to officers, who state that Mr. Allen then swerved his car into a big machine driven by A. B. Bailey, of Eugene. The Bailey car, a sedan, was practically demolished, the entire left side, from the driver's seat to the rear wheel, being ripped off. The big car is said to have rolled over twice and the Allen car was badly mangled in the front end.

Mr. Allen is to face a charge of driving while intoxicated, while Mr. Brownell will face a charge of drunkenness on a public highway. Mr. Brownell was a candidate for the office of district attorney at the last election.

ROAD CONTRACT CONFERENCE IS ON IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 21. (AP)—Fred Herrick, who is handling a big logging enterprise in the national forest in Malheur county, and his engineer, James W. Girard, were in Portland today in conference with District Forester Granger, of certain details of the contract with the government which have not been carried out within the time set. Herrick entered into the contract with the government in 1923 and the terms called for extensive railway construction into the project which embraces 900,000,000 feet of timber in Malheur forest. Thirty miles of road from Crane to Burns is completed and the project calls for 52 miles from Crane to Seneca where the operations are conducted. The grade is largely completed on this but no truck has been laid. Herrick has already had one extension of time and on April 1 this expired without the completion of all the work stipulated.

P. Talent, south of Ashland in connection with an alleged automobile theft in Southern California. Two of the boys—Roberts and Beach—claim the responsibility, claiming the other two to be tag-sawyers they had picked up at San Francisco on route north. A federal charge will probably be placed.

LONGVIEW, Wash., Apr. 21. (AP)—William Carey, 21, of Toledo, Oregon, was killed almost instantly by a rolling log while at work for the Midway Logging company near Stella, yesterday afternoon. MAUNA LOA IS LESS VIOLENT

HILO, T. H., Apr. 21. (AP)—Tossing huge formations into the air at the point of the recent rushes of lava, Mauna Loa continued to show signs of eruption during the night but there were no lava flows either toward Kona or Kaa.

A rancher returning from a journey toward the summit of the volcano said he had found a small fan-shaped flow from the rift whence had issued the recent lava flow, but the flow was no weak that the lava cooled and became slag after traveling 400 or 500 feet.

Halemauana, the "pit of everlasting fire," showed no visible signs of eruption following a series of strong earth shocks yesterday afternoon.

BIG INCUBATOR ABOUT READY FOR ANOTHER HATCH

The large incubator, owned by J. Powers and William Kamberg, at Medical Springs will hatch for the second time this season the first of next week. The incubator, which was installed this spring, is heated by hot water from the natural warm spring there and is kept at a temperature of 102 degrees. When filled it will hold 6000 eggs. The incubator hatched for the first time about three weeks ago. After the little chicks are hatched they are brooded by the hot water from the spring. The water used for this purpose is 90 degrees. The brooder house is equipped with cells glass in the place of ordinary window glass, to let the violet light rays in to the little chicks.

Mr. Kamberg and Mr. Powers have stocked their farms with some of the best white leghorn chickens and expect to increase the number within the next four years until they have one of the largest commercial poultry plants in the county. Besides raising chicks for their own use they have hatched many for others.

They prepare their own feed for the baby chicks, which contains cod liver oil in addition to other material used. This they claim will stimulate the growth of the chickens.
