TRACKMEN TO MEET BUCKS

Sixteen truculent tracksters invading La Grande from Pendleton Saturday will find the home forces prepared to hold the fort. In the opinion of Coach Thornton Bennett, it will be the first test on the local field, and the Tigers are eager to show their boosters what they can do. The events are scheduled to start at 2 p. m.

"The Round-up bunch is bringing in some strong men, but unless they catch us in a streak of bad luck as Baker did last week, we're going to surprise them with the beating of their lives," the mentor prophesied this noon.

Shewwood in Shape.

Allen, colored broad jumper, has been stretching out to 21 feet, it is reported. The other dozen includes Johnson, Adkinson, Sullivan, G. Jones, H. Miller, Huntley, McPhail, Swank, Cronin, Allen, Luck, Shanton and Pahl.

Lee Reynolds has been drafted to officiate as referee and starter. J. E. Reynolds, Jack Peare and G. L. Dutton will be timekeepers. Nolan Skiff will be clerk of the course. Head judges have been appointed as follows: Jimmie Rosenbaum, jumps; G. W. Campbell, weights; O. W. Richelleu, finish. John Larson will be announcer. The inspectors will be Clyde Selzer, Owen Price, E. A. McLachlan and Eugene Mettuff. The assistant field judges named are Ellis Snyder, Floyd Perry and Kermit Rogala.

PHILADELPHIA, Apr. 22 (AP).—More than 3,000 athletes from all sections of the United States will take part in the University of Pennsylvania's thirty-second annual relay carnival at Franklin field tomorrow and Saturday. Schools and colleges to the number of 524 will be represented. The entry list includes Olympic, intercollegiate, marathon and world's champions. Fifty events will be started and concluded tomorrow.

The Occidental college team of Los Angeles reached Philadelphia late yesterday and went through a light workout on the field.

Two entries, Occidental and Oregon Aggies, represent the western coast.

Oregon Relay Team to Be Selected Saturday

EUGENE, Ore., Apr. 22 (AP).—The University of Oregon team to compete in the Washington relays at Seattle, May 1, will be chosen after Saturday's tryouts, according to Coach Hayward. Rain interfered with yesterday's session, and the tracksters are not in good condition, he said.

Two teams are almost certain to start for Oregon. In the two mile relay are Overstreet, Thorsternberg, Mauney and Kelly, and in the medley are Extra, Ager, Overstreet and Kelly.

Jerry Extra or Harry Holt will start in the 100-yard dash. Francis Cleaver or either Walter Kelsey or Ralph Tuck will start in the high hurdles. Extra, Holt and Pendergast, with a fourth man yet to be selected will be entered in the two-mile relay.

A four-mile relay team may not be entered.

Ecklund won the first fall in one hour, two minutes and the third in four minutes, fifty seconds. The Boston man took the second fall in five minutes, three seconds.

Muldoon Backs Rickard In Dempsey-Tunney Go

NEW YORK, Apr. 22 (AP).—Tex Rickard will not face united opposition in the state athletic commission in his plans to promote a Jack Dempsey-Gene Tunney title battle here in September. In spite of the threat of James A. Farley, commission chairman, to discipline the promoter.

William Muldoon, 51-year-old member of the commission and former champion, has come out in support of Rickard's plans and taken sharp issue with Farley.

Muldoon is quoted today by the Times as "decidedly opposed" to a bout between Dempsey and Harry Wills, while believing a "Tunney-Dempsey fight would be far more interesting."

"I approve of Rickard's actions," Muldoon said. "All this threatening Rickard, these announcements that he would be kept out of boxing here, are ridiculous to anybody familiar with the situation."
