Breakfast—Canned cherries, toasted shredded wheat biscuits with hot milk, broiled cottage ham, rye muffins, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Stuffed onions with white sauce, bran bread, prune whip, boiled custard, milk tea.

Dinner—Baked shad with raisins, new potatoes in parsley butter, beets in orange sauce, graham bread, pineapple sandwiches, milk, coffee.

The housekeeper who likes to serve meals just a little bit "different" may find something new in this dinner menu. The pineapple sandwiches use shredded fresh fruit well sweetened between thin slices of sponge cake or angel food. The "sandwich" is then masked with whipped cream.

Baked shad with raisins is not an everyday dish but is quite delicious and worth while.
