**Daylight Saving Time Starts in East Sunday.**

NEW YORK, Apr. 24 (AP).—Daylight saving in various states and cities starts at 2 a. m. tomorrow and will remain in effect until September 26. Clocks will be an hour fast compared with standard time.  
Rhode Island and Massachusetts will be entirely on daylight time. By local opinion, daylight time will be observed by various cities in New York, New Jersey, Maine, Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Kentucky, Delaware, Ohio, Illinois, Indiana, Michigan and Wisconsin.

Every large city in New York will use daylight time, as well as Philadelphia and Chicago, New Orleans, White Star and United American lines will go on daylight saving. The United States time, however, will stay on eastern standard.

The New York stock exchange will open and close an hour earlier than it has been doing under standard time.

It is against the law in Connecticut for public clocks to show daylight saving time, but business firms in the principal cities will go by the new time.

## NEW FLOW OF LAVA SIGHTED

HILO, T. H., Apr. 24 (AP).—What is believed to be a new lava flow from Mauna Loa was reported last night by observers who said they clearly saw a "big fire river" approximately a mile from the main road between the village that was Hoopulua and Honoumalo.  
Dr. Thomas A. Jaggar, in charge of the Hawaiian volcanic observatory, was inclined to believe that the latest reported flow of lava was a recurrence of Thursday's flow. Authentic reports said the new river of lava was traveling about two feet every minute and was directed toward ranch houses and the village of Honoumalo.  
Workers departed last night for the vicinity to move belongings, including horses and cattle, to safety.
