In mood and treatment with masterly versatility. And they made of the succession of songs a unified presentation, linking it to an effective climax in the quartet, "I Saw the Red-Covered Spring Fox," and relinquishing it with a flourish of reluctance in the closing strains of "O Spirit of the Spring, Delay."

Interpreting the quartets were solo, recitatives, aria, duet and serenade. Ray Williams, baritone, gave rich pleasure when he sang the baritone solo, "I Marius Am," a demanding number that seemed particularly adapted to exhibit his voice. Mrs. Richardson, in the aria, "Welcome, Sweet Spring!" gave an admirable demonstration of coloratura technique. She was in her best voice last night, and executed the embellished score with ease and effect. Mrs. W. H. Bohnenkamp Jr., always a delight to hear, was especially appreciated in her dramatic solo, "The Moon Behind the Cottonwood." H. J. Dykhuus as the new member of the quartet was received with interest and approval in his numerous solo appearances. His recitative, tenor, lent itself gracefully to the plaintive score that was his in the quartets. His duet with Mrs. Richardson was warm with color. Perhaps the audience liked best his serenade, "I Cannot Sing to Thee, as I Would Sing."

Mrs. Tedford, at the piano, contributed a full measure to the musical treat. Her accompaniments were both sympathetic and artistically submerged. In her solos, the prelude and the intermezzo, she skillfully prepared the audience for the vocal numbers that were to follow.

MUSSOLINI MOBILIZING IS REPORT

Heved to have established undisputed dictatorship and complete mastery of the state.

All reported information obtained in Rome indicates that Mussolini realizing that lack of raw material handicaps the country from the very start, wants more colonies. In this respect duplicating the ambitions of the Germans, who want the restoration of some of their lost colonies with which to provide additional raw material to feed home industries.

Trade Balance Unfavorable.
Last year Italy's unfavorable trade balance reached \$3,000,000,000 lire. Her imports chiefly wheat and oil from the United States alone aggregated 4,000,000,000 lire more than her exports to the United States. Wheat purchases in the United States constitute the largest adverse item in the Italian trade balance and to offset this Mussolini has launched his spectacular "battle of grain" in which the peasants of the peninsula are contributing to the national solidarity endeavoring to augment the harvest.

Where, however, will Mussolini get his desired colonies? That is another question which is put at Rome. The recent landing of an Italian military contingent on the border of Siam, East Africa, indicates to observers that the fascist premier presumably will, like the Japanese in Manchuria, and Shantung, endeavor to create "zones of influence" in Africa.

Seeking New Colonies.
This policy already has begun as regards Abyssinia, which joined the league primarily to prevent encroachments on her sovereign rights. In a stricter economic sense, reliable information shows that Mussolini will endeavor to bring the entire Balkan peninsula within the domain of Italy's commercial expansion. This program has been begun by the establishment of relations of amity and collaboration with Greece and negotiations with Yugoslavia looking to the creation of a pact of security under the aegis of Italy and France.

The Roman government with its extensive merchant marine, hopes to capture the Russian market by the easy access of Italian ships from the Mediterranean to the Black sea and seeks to purchase wheat and oil from Russia at a cost less than that it pays to the United States.

Wants Savoy, Nice.
An unauthoritative report is going the rounds in diplomatic circles of Rome that in return for throwing her forces on the side of the allies against the central powers, once her allies, Italy has dreamed of the annexation of the French provinces of Savoy and Nice, which passed to France from

O. S. T. A. WORK IS APPROVED

Voters are urged to "carefully examine into the characters, educational records and moral standings of all candidates for nomination for state superintendent of public instruction before they cast the ballots at the primaries" in one of the four main resolutions passed by the 29 educators present in La Grande for the annual meeting of the Eastern Oregon Superintendents and Principals association Saturday afternoon.

The association went on record also as strongly favoring the establishment of a state normal school in Eastern Oregon, and pledged its members to work each in his own community to that end.

The Oregon State Teachers association's study and investigation of more equitable distribution of the tax burden was approved by the superintendents and principals.

They voted to urge a 100 percent affiliation of their teachers in the O. S. T. A. and the National Education association, in view of the extensive programs of work those organizations have undertaken.

After the final session, the association adjourned to attend the Pendleton-La Grande track meet on the high school field.

J. T. Longfellow, president, and E. D. Towler, secretary, will begin the duties of their new offices immediately.

Hillsboro Judge Will Preside at Medford

MEDFORD, Ore., Apr. 26 (AP)—Judge George H. Bagshaw, of Hillsboro, of the nineteenth judicial district has been appointed by the state supreme court to hear the trial of Dr. C. T. Sweeney, local physician, and former member of the legislature, charged with perjury.

Dr. Bagshaw arrived Sunday and today is hearing arguments on a defense demurrer attacking the validity of the indictment.

The case has been marked by the filing of affidavits of prejudice against presiding jurists.

Keown's first throw of the javelin, which measured 150 feet, was sufficient to take first in that event. Davis won the half mile in the fast time of 2 minutes 11 3/4 seconds, and Keown came home in the mile, with little opposition, in 5 minutes 12 3/4 seconds.

Smuts took the 440-yard dash, and Lyman the pole vault for the remainder of the "Tigers" first. Allen won the high hurdles, tied with Zundel in the high jump and turned in the best broad jump of the day. Hutton, in the shot, took the other Pendleton first with a heave of 42 feet 1 inch.
