TRIALS SHOW FUTURE STARS

Followers of high school sports collected a great throng last evening when tryouts were held among the grade schools of the city to select contestants to represent La Grande in the county relay school meet that will be held at Union town.

All the way up from the fifth grade, future high school stars revealed themselves. But particularly eye-catching were the flashing displays of Melvin Whalen and Frank Kamasawa, of Greenwood. Two clocks caught them in their respective heads at 4-4 and 11. Both are fighting fast on the skirts, and run with unusual strides that get them over the ground. In the 100s, Whalen beat Kamasawa.

Other Stars Twinkle. A half dozen other kids showed their stuff. By the time the inter-grade school meet is held here in May, there should be at least eight future high school stars in action, or latent talent and willingness to go.

No definite results were attached in the first four grade 75-yard events. In the 75th grade, Kamasawa, of Central, qualified, but Hanson and Berger, both of Central, have yet to compete against candidates from the other two schools.

In the sixth grade studies, Workman, Jones and Sinn, all of Central, beat out of Greenwood, and Green, of Central, with one from Ilwaco, must run again for first, second and third positions.

Teams Qualify Instant. In the seventh grade studies, Witham, Reese and Pans, of Ilwaco, qualified, with Tye, of Greenwood, as alternate.

In the eighth, Whalen, Kamasawa, both of Greenwood, with Gullman, of Central, qualified, with Otto Cochran, of Greenwood, as alternate.

Greenwood fifth graders showed about levels all the way in the relay races, and will go to Union town.

Central team won in the sixth, and will go home.

To Race 'Worldbeaters.' In the seventh grade relay, the Ilwaco team, with a possible substitution for Tye, from Greenwood, will represent La Grande.

Greenwood eighth grade will send its entire team, with the possible substitution of Gullman, of Central.

Plans are afoot for getting the Greenwood eighth graders, with what is tentatively to be the world-leading eighth grade team from Portland.

Track and field trophies and the new medals will be selected at a later date.

HOFF TO TAKE PART IN MEET

SEATTLE, Apr. 27. (AP)—Charlie Hoff, Norwegian pole vaulter, arrives here tomorrow morning to participate in the annual University of Washington relay carnival Saturday in which more than 200 Pacific Northwest college and high school athletes have signed to appear.

Four classes of teams are entered. The relay contest conference members including Washington, Montana, Oregon, Idaho, Washington State and Oregon Agricultural colleges are the class A entries. Northwest conference colleges and normal schools are in class B. Washington state high schools constitute class C, and Seattle prep schools make up class D.

George Clarke, of Spokane, Husky sprinter, is matched against Harold Sweet, Jacobs of Washington State, Hill, of Oregon and others in the 110-yard dash.

Because of its victory over the University of Illinois at the Drake relays, Chicago Saturday the O. A. C. four mile relay team will be closely watched.

HOFF CLEARED. NEW YORK, Apr. 27. (AP)—Charlie Hoff, world's champion pole vaulter from Norway, appears to have been cleared before an inquiry by the Amateur Athletic Union, started about his expense accounts in regard to participation in American track events.
