SAN FRANCISCO, Apr. 27. (AP)—The machinery of an army inquiry in the case of Captain Oreville Clappitt, was set in motion last night with swift precision by General H. D. ROME, Apr. 27 (AP)—John Adams Abbott, 24, son of Mrs. Gratton St. Lee Abbott of Boston, Mass., was arrested today on a charge of assaulting Salvatore Astorino, a Roman guide, and insulting Premier Mussolini.

Abbott and Astorino engaged in an argument after the guide is said to have usurped the American's place in a line of tourists awaiting entrance to the Vatican gardens. The quarrel was renewed in the halls of one of the Vatican buildings and again at Abbott's hotel, to which he invited the guide in order to settle the affair.

The pair engaged in a fist fight in front of the hotel, the American landing with such effect that Astorino was taken to the hospital.
