The Garden

GOOD GARDEN IN CLAY SOIL

Clay soil often deters a home owner from starting a vegetable garden because of a belief that clay isn't good soil for vegetables, notwithstanding the fact that this same soil supports a heavy growth of weeds. A clay soil can give a very good garden. The main difficulty is getting a start at it, for it is not the easiest soil to work. The original spading will be the big job. Better still, have it plowed, if possible.

Clay soil needs the constant addition of vegetable matter spaded into it to improve its quality and make it break apart more readily. Stable manure should be found for this kind of soil if possible. It will pay to manure it heavily at the start, not so much for fertility as to get a start on breaking it up.

Working pulverized limestone into a clay soil is another step that will, in a few seasons, bring a surprising result in the way of making it tillable. Once the clay is broken up and put under cultivation it will be found to be improving in texture with each season's working as air is let into it and vegetable matter incorporated. It is an excellent idea to spade in

manure or vegetable compost in other soils and should not be worked the fall in bringing into shape for use until later in the spring than the average garden soil. It is very

COOLIDGE SEEKS COLUMBIA BASIN INVESTIGATION

WASHINGTON, Apr. 27. (AP)—President Coolidge transmitted a request to congress today for an appropriation of \$25,000 for investigation of the Columbia basin irrigation project in the northwest. The expenditure has been authorized by congress.

The president also asked congress for a supplemental appropriation of \$55,000 for use in reclaiming approximately 2,400 acres of Indian land and 600 acres of privately owned land within and adjacent to Lummi Indian reservation in Washington.
