## STOWAWAYS MEET DEATH

MARSEILLES, France, Apr. 23. (AP)—Eleven Arab stowaways in the hold of the steamer Sidl Ferrugh are known to be dead and eighteen were still missing today as a result of the collapse of their hiding place in the ship's coal bunkers during a rough passage from Algiers to Marseilles.

Two of the stowaways have been dug out of the coal, seriously injured and ten others have been rescued suffering from slight hurts. The eleven bodies recovered were bruised and blackened beyond recognition when huge blocks of coal, loosened by a storm, fell upon them.

Marseilles authorities have refused sailing orders to the Sidl Ferrugh in order that the ship may be combed from stem to stern in an effort to learn the fate of the eighteen Arabs known to be aboard.

## NIAGARA FALLS THRILL SEEKER DIES IN SOUTH

NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y., Apr. 29. (AP)—The death of Bobby Leach, intrepid falls thrill seeker, reported from Christ church, New Zealand today, removes one of the most picturesque figures from the Niagara district. Besides going over the falls in a barrel on July 25, 1911, Leach many times defied the falls as a background.

He successfully negotiated the whirlpool rapids in a barrel dropped with a parachute from the upper arch bridge over the gorge, and from an airplane over the falls, and performed many other similar feats of daring.

His last bid for notoriety here was last fall when he attempted to swim the lower river just before the falls. He failed when he tried to recover his false teeth which fell out, and was brought back to shore by a boat that had been following him. The feat was successfully accomplished a week or so later by William Hill, veteran Canadian river man, causing much chagrin.
