49 C. M. T. Camps Will Train Largest "Army"

**NEW YORK, Apr. 29.**—On a larger scale than ever before, the sixth annual Citizens Military Training Camps will open in June and continue through July and August.

Although 20,000 American youths already have applied, the attendance this year will be limited to 35,000 young men between the ages of 17 and 24 who can pass the required physical examination.

At forty-nine open-air posts and camps flung across the United States, these youths will be the guests of the government for thirty days of athletic, citizenship and military training. They will emerge to join the ranks of the 126,419 other youths who have gone before them during the last

five years. Although army appropriations are the same this year, 2,000 more students will be trained and ten more camps opened than last year.

Germany Is Opposed to Confiscation Is Word

**BERLIN, Apr. 29. (AP)**—Opening the Reichstag debate on the bill for confiscation of the former German ruler's property, Count Westarp, the nationalist leader, declared the German nation was unalterably opposed to confiscation, which was contrary to the principles of justice.

Count Westarp insisted that the Kaiser had gone to Holland not because he was cowardly but because he hoped that Germany would thereby obtain better peace terms from the allies.

American League to Permit Use of Resin

**NEW YORK, Apr. 29. (AP)**—American league owners yesterday capitulated to a recommendation by Baseball Commissioner Landis and voted to provide its umpires with resin for the use of pitchers. The magnates at the same time reaffirmed their disapproval of the practice and took steps to urge discontinuance of its use in the box.

The league which voted last winter not to permit use of resin, and instructed its umpires to see that its verdict was enforced, decided today "to instruct managers to require their pitchers to ask for the resin bag" after having decided to comply with the commissioner's interpretation of the rule.
