Sister Mary Says:

Breakfast—Apple sauce, cereal cooked with dates, thin cream, ham toast, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Baked codfish, brown bread and butter, new onion, drop molasses cookies, canned pears, milk, tea.

Dinner—Roast veal, potatoes en casserole, beet greens, new cabbage salad, prune cake with whipped cream, bran bread, milk, coffee.

Potatoes and flaked codfish are rubbed through a colander to make the luncheon dish. This is an excellent dish for children, one of the very few "made" dishes that is perfectly all right for them.

This prune cake is rather out of the ordinary but most delicious. It can be used for afternoon tea, as cake with fruit or with whipped cream as suggested here.

Prune Cake

One-half pound prunes, 1 1/2 cups sugar, 2 cups flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder, one half teaspoon soda, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 cup sour cream, 3 eggs, 4 tablespoons soft butter.

Wash and soak prunes in one cup of cold water for two hours. Cook in this water until tender and water is evaporated. Remove stones and chop coarsely. Mix and sift dry ingredients. Add prunes and mix thoroughly. Stir in cream and add eggs well beaten. Beat in softened butter. Pour into an oiled and floured square pan and bake one hour in a moderate oven. Cut in squares and serve warm with whipped cream.

259 Rescued from Ship Wreck Off Paramushiru

TOKYO, Apr. 29 (AP)—The fishermen and crew of the Chichibu Maru, numbering 259, have been rescued from the wrecked vessel off Paramushiru, farthest north of Kurile Islands. Safety of the men, for whom there was little hope felt, was announced in a dispatch to the Jiji from Hokkaido Island.

The Chichibu Maru, which was a small steam of the crab canning industry, crashed upon the rocks Tuesday while proceeding to Kamohaka. It was believed that all on board would perish in the heavy storm sweeping across the islands.
