

CHINESE RULE IS ATTACKED

CANTON, China, Apr. 30. (AP)—The new Canton government set up late in March by a coup d'état which eliminated all more radical elements were expelled from power, issued a manifesto today asserting that the government of Peking has been reestablished by the Chinese people and calling on foreign powers to refuse recognition to "whatever" militarists happen to occupy Peking.

The manifesto is signed by the executive committee of the Nationalist government of the Nationalist government as the new ruling body itself. The committee includes Dr. C. C. Wu, son of the famous Wu Ting-fang; Tan Yen-shan, former governor of Hunan; Hu Han-min, former governor of Kwangtung, and other prominent men, most of them followers Sun Yat-sen.

The nationalist government declares the presidential act of Peking has been nullified by bribery; Sun Yat-sen, former president, Tso Kuo-tung, the so-called government of Peking the manifesto claims, is only a series of tyrants its existence made possible only by the support of foreign powers which seriously "interfere" with the international affairs of China.
