SOUTHPAWS DELIVER

Looks as if this would be a good year for southpaws in the majors. Left-handed pitchers are inclined to resort to the curve ball as their best weapon.

Unquestionably the new ball in use is better to curve from the manner in which southpaw pitchers have been winning since the opening of the season.

Some of the pitchers insist the ball is properly balanced and for that reason takes the curve better.

Regardless of the real reason, curve ball pitching is getting a strong play in both leagues, with the southpaws featuring the hook.

IRELAND WILL TRY GARLAND

CORK, Ireland, May 1. (AP)—Patrick Garland, of New York, who was arrested at Queensland with alleged incriminating evidence, is to be tried for treason, being accused of conspiracy to overthrow the government of the Irish Free State. He is held without bail at Dublin.

He was a fireman on the Lantana when it was torpedoed. He had documents when arrested which told that negotiations were under way in the United States for the purchase of machine guns. It is stated.

Other communications addressed to prominent republican leaders in Ireland were also found on him.

Garland was arrested when he landed in Queensland from the Steamer Adriatic. The documents were found suspended under his shirt from a string about his neck. He said that he intended no wrong doing and if he had known of the contents of the package he would have burned it.

FAIR WEATHER FOR RELAYS

BRATTLE, Wash., May 1. (AP)—Fair skies and light breezes were predicted for the annual University of Washington relay carnival here today, with Charles Hoff of Norway appearing as the main attraction to break the world's pole vault record.

The Universities of Oregon, Montana, Idaho and Washington, Washington State college and Oregon Agricultural college were the conference schools entered.

A 120-yard high hurdle was included on the program for the first time.

Two mile relay, 8 minutes 5.5 seconds held by Rankin, Dodge, Snyder and Booth, of Oregon Agricultural college.

Four mile relay, 18 minutes 3 seconds, held by Bell, Huttis, Mason and Clayton of Oregon Agricultural college.

The Tincher credit bill and the pending cooperative marketing bill were endorsed by Secretary Jardine in an address today before the annual conference of the Farmers' union. He also favored recognition through higher prices for quality production of cotton.

Expressing the opinion that the Tincher bill, one of the three divergent surplus crops proposals pending in the house "will pave the way for a better stabilization of prices than farmers have ever enjoyed before, the secretary said:

"It opens up the opportunity to check most of the glut and fluctuations which upset the markets so disastrously. It will put resources in the hands of farmers such as have long been at the disposal of other business groups."
