OREGON TEAMS WIN TWO FIRSTS AT RELAY MEET

SEATTLE, Wash., May 3. (AP)—In eight varsity events in the University of Washington relay yesterday the Huskies and the University of Montana, took three firsts in three each and the University of Oregon and Oregon Agricultural college in one each.

Charles Hoff, of Norway, world champion, pole vaulted 13 feet 3 inches in an exhibition. He tried 14 feet and failed. The mark stands at 13 feet 11 13-16 inches which Hoff holds.

Washington took first in the shot put two-mile relay and mile relay. Montana took first in the 100-yard dash, 150-yard relay and the medley relay. Oregon captured the 120 yard hurdles and the O. A. C. the 4-mile relay.

VAN ORMAN IS RACE WINNER

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., May 2. (AP)—Balloons that started from here Thursday in the Little Rock cup and National Elimination Balloon race today had reported and all that remained to be done was collect the scientific instruments carried and forward them to Washington for formal announcement of the distance covered.

Measurements showed that Ward T. Van Orman, winner of the race, who landed near Petersburg, Va., had covered approximately 415 miles. The "Akron N. A. A." piloted by John A. Bostner; the United States Army, 8-23, piloted by Captain Hawthorne Gray and the United States Army 8-21 piloted by Lieut. John Franklin Rowell, were so closely bunched that official measurements will be necessary to determine the bags that got second and third place.

Bostner covered approximately 595 miles, Captain Gray 525 and Lieut. Rowell 526. The "Akron N. A. A." was landed near Welch, W. Va., and the two army balloons in North Carolina, the 8-23 near Mount Holly and the 8-21 near Hickory.
