Miss Betty Cochran, president of the junior class, presided as toastmistress. The program subject was "The Garden." A lattice work fence around the room was covered with hollyhock. In one corner of the room the orchestra was seated. At the other end of the gymnasium was a garden swing and shrubbery.

Cream Sandwiches
One cup minced cream, 2 tablespoons minced pimento, 1/4 cup cottage cheese, 4 tablespoon finely chopped pecans or English walnuts, salt, paprika, mayonnaise.
