As a result of this intense volcanic activity," says Dr. Hodge, "Mount Multnomah was built into a gigantic cone more than 15,000 feet high, with a base extending from the vicinity of Elkmap Springs on the west, Three Sisters on the east, beyond Mount Washington on the north, and to Elk lake on the south."

TOKYO, May 2 (AP)—A navy dispatch from a destroyer near the Kuril islands, the northeast archipelago of Japan, received today declared that 150 fishermen and crew of the Chichibu Maru, a small fishing steamer which was wrecked on the rocks off Paramushiro, early last week, still are missing.

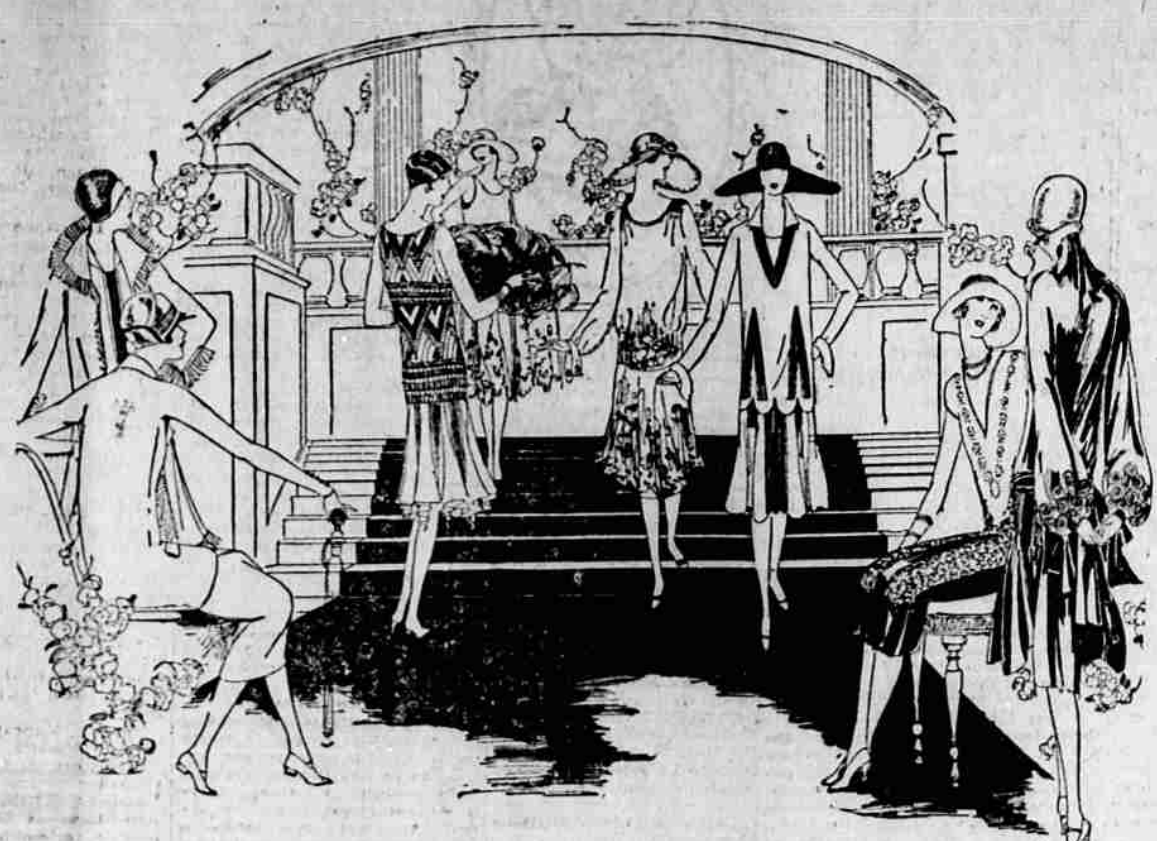

PENDLETON, May 2 (AP)—Mrs. Ellis G. Brower, 27, of Pendleton, was instantly killed Saturday evening when a car driven by Donald Robinson overturned on the highway 18 miles east of Pendleton.

CHILD DROWNED

CHICO, Cal., May 2 (AP)—Playing on the bank of the Sacramento river last night while his mother looked on, Francis Barringer, 6 years old, lost his footing, fell into the stream and was drowned. His body was not recovered.

TWO HURT IN KLAMATH

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., May 2 (AP)—Harry Landers, 26, lumber worker, is near death, and his wife is suffering from a fractured skull, the result of a crash on a main thoroughfare here Saturday night.

AGED MAN SUICIDES

JEFFERSON, Ore., May 2 (AP)—Matt Sigensuhl, about 82 years old, was found hanging in his woodshed about noon Sunday on his farm near Greene's bridge. He was born in Germany and came to the United States about 55 years ago, making his home on the farm near here for the past 50 years. He has no known relatives in this country.
