WALL STREET NOTES STRIKE

NEW YORK, May 3. (AP)—Despite the lowering of money rates, stock prices turned decidedly reactionary today on selling inspired by the British labor crisis. An opening decline of one to five points was followed by a rally which wiped out many of the earlier losses, but fresh selling broke out again in the afternoon when the cable extracts of Premier Baldwin's speech reached the financial district.

Outside the stock market, the chief effect of the British strike was felt in the foreign exchange markets. Sterling exchange sold down over half a cent and the French and Belgian currencies sank to record low levels. Bond prices also were heavy with the foreign government obligations reflecting the uncertainty over the outcome in Great Britain.

Closing was weak. Total sales approximated 1,600,000 shares.

CHICAGO, May 3. (AP)—Depressing effects of the British strike became acute in the wheat market today just before the close. General selling developed on receipt of news that Premier Baldwin had said that the strike leaders had gone no nearer to civil war than Great Britain had been for centuries. Wheat closed nervous, 15 1/2 to 1/2 cent lower; corn unchanged to 1/2 cent and oats 1/2 to 1/2 cent down.

CHICAGO, May 3. (U. S. Cattle receipts 15,000; in between grade of fat steers predominating; trade strong to 15c higher; mostly 10 to 15c up; spot more well finished steers, all representative weight, comparatively scarce; best heaves \$10.40; yearlings \$10.25; she stock fairly active; strong; heavy hogs, bulk up to \$7.75; to adders; light weaners 25c lower, \$8.50 to \$9; bulk weaners to packers \$8.50 to \$9.50; outsiders up to \$11.50.

Sheep receipts 15,000; fat lambs opening slow; big packers rather heavy; shipping demand fairly broad; medium weight of market steady to strong; best wool lambs held around \$15.75; clipper \$14.50; few early sales of fat clipped ewes steady at \$8.75 to \$9.

Strawberries Drop to \$3 @ \$3.25 a Crate

PORTLAND, Ore., May 3. (AP)—Close to 1000 crates of strawberries arrived on the early growers and ranchers market this morning besides those brought in direct to the association of Japanese gardeners. Prices opened firm with most of the growers holding out for \$3.50, but the market soon broke and the bulk of the fruit went at \$3 to \$3.25 a crate.

Growers from every section report a serious need of moisture in berry patches. The fruit is ripening rapidly but the young fruit is not doing so well. A good soaking rain would make a bumper crop and improve the quality.

Clarke county growers report their berry crops coming on with a rush now, but the late crop will be short unless rain falls in the near future.

Two cars of California berries were due in today but produce dealers are skeptical with the local crop coming in heavy. Some of them took a bumping Saturday.

Among the team track arrivals this morning was a car of fancy colts. It is firm and higher with the wholesalers asking \$9 to \$9.50 a crate. A car of peas and mixed vegetables was also spotted. The first carload of cantaloupes is due in Portland Thursday or Friday of this week. It will probably be split with the Seattle market.

The first cantaloupes of the season in the local market were received in Portland by the Pacific Fruit and Produce company. A single flat crate of 12 melons was received by express from El Centro, Cal. The melons were sold for \$7.

Butter and eggs are generally steady today at Saturday's closing levels.

There were quite a few country dressed calves carried over the week end and with today's receipts the market was very unsettled. Choice light veal continued to bring 15 1/2 to 16 cents and hogs 18c. Pork reflected the decline at the close.

Front street butchers are almost bare of live poultry and the market is firm on all lines but light springs. These continue to drag. Heavy broilers, weighing 2 pounds and better are eagerly sought at 28 to 30 cents. Light broilers sold at 23 to 24 cents. Light and medium hens also in demand at 25 to 26 cents. Heavy hens up to 28c.

Breier Stores Plan Advertising Campaign

Derek White, well known Pacific coast advertising man, has just been appointed advertising and promotion manager of the C. J. Breier company's chain of department stores, according to an announcement of E. A. Stevens, manager of the local Breier store. It is planned to strengthen the position of the Breier company by means of an advertising campaign to be carried on locally and in 25 other Northwestern towns, throughout the year.

Some of the points to be brought out by the campaign, which is to start next month, will be the fact that with buyers in New York and western style centers at all times, and with the buying power of the strong Breier chain, residents in even the smallest towns have available the latest fashions and styles as quickly as the same styles reach metropolitan points such as Los Angeles, Portland and Seattle.

CALIFORNIA FURTH

WASHINGTON, May 3. (AP)—California increased its merchandise exports for 1925 by a total of \$13,500,000 over the previous year to maintain its fifth place in the relative standing of the various states of the union in the matter of foreign shipments. This was revealed in statistics made public today by the department of commerce. Total exports for 1925 from the Golden Gate were set at \$248,235,719, as compared with \$224,684,219 for the preceding year.
