He has been particularly fortunate with pitchers labeled through by other managers. Credit for this unusual success with discarded twirlers has been attributed to the fact that Robinson as a player was a great catcher. It is beginning to look as if Rogers Hornsby of the St. Louis Cardinals is to share the spotlight that has been playing on genial Wilbert Robinson for these many years.

CORRECT DOPE

When I talked with Hornsby at the spring training camp of the Cardinals, his pitching was the only thing that gave him much concern.

"Rival clubs may not see it as I do, but I figure Keen, Huntzinger and Johnson are going to be a great help to my club."

"They have shown plenty of stuff and under the direction of Bill Killefer should be much improved pitchers this year. I am positive the former Cub manager will just about make my pitching staff."

"I know what Keen and Huntzinger can do and everybody tells me that Johnson, who once cost Detroit a lot of money, should win for me."

"Huntzinger has had the benefit of several years under McGraw and that means much. However, I intend to start Huntzinger and give him a four or five-day rest between games. With New York he was a better pitcher almost entirely and he is hardly strong enough for that role."

"I also intend to use Johnson and Keen as regulars and am pretty sure they will deliver."

"That Hornsby had the right dope a month before the opening of the season has been proven by the excellent work of these three pitchers."

OREGON TO HOLD TENNIS TOURNAMENT LATE THIS MONTH

EUGENE, Ore., May 4. (AP)—A district junior-tennis championship tournament will be held at the University of Oregon May 27-29. The tournament is authorized by the United States Lawn Tennis association. All entrants will be under the age of 18 years. Winners will be eligible for competition in the Pacific northwest championship tournament to be held in Tacoma this summer. The Eugene district will include all cities from Eugene to the California line and north as far as Corvallis and Albany. The remainder of the state will be taken in by the Portland and Salem districts.

SAFETY FIRST FILMS SHOWN

The moving picture car, which has been exhibiting safety first films over the Union Pacific railway system arrived in La Grande and showed pictures here for the first time yesterday. The car, which is in charge of W. M. Freeman and G. E. Williams, is equipped to seat 75 people. A picture projecting machine is arranged in one end of the car and a motion picture screen in the other. Regulation films are used.

Pictures are shown at eight o'clock in the morning, at twelve o'clock and at 4:15 in the afternoon. Two films entitled "Safety First", are being shown. These films concern shop work and train operation and are of interest principally to employees of the railway company. One industrial film issued by the Ford Motor company, showing the factory in being exhibited and two films entitled "Gambling with Death." These films show the dangers of highway crossings and the automobile and the locomotive and is one that would be of interest to the general public. The one other film to be shown here is "Ask Daddy," and is concerned with home life. This picture and the one entitled "Gambling with Death" were

shown this morning before a group of grade school children in the high school auditorium. There is an interesting story in connection with lesson given by the pictures. The public is invited to visit the motion picture car any time to see the pictures.

The pictures are exhibited under the direction of J. F. Grodzki, general safety agent for the O-W, to promote safety on both the railway and away from the railway.

The motion picture car will complete its program Saturday at Huntington. It will be here until Thursday night and go from here to Baker and from there on to Huntington.

Pioneer Mine Operator Dies in Spokane, Wash.

SPokane, Wash., May 4. (AP)—Volney D. Williamson, 61, pioneer mine operator of the Coeur d'Alene district, died here last night after an illness of several weeks. Mr. Williamson was born at Oakland, Ore., in 1865, the son of Bol Williamson after whom the Williamson river in Oregon was named. He operated along the Kootenai lake mining district and was interested in several mine properties in Idaho and British Columbia and was president of several mining companies in the U. S. and two in Mexico. He was the first to discover a turquoise mine in Mexico, while operating the old Santa Rosa mine. Mr. Williamson was also connected with the building of the Oregon trunk railway.
