Entertain Children At May Day Party

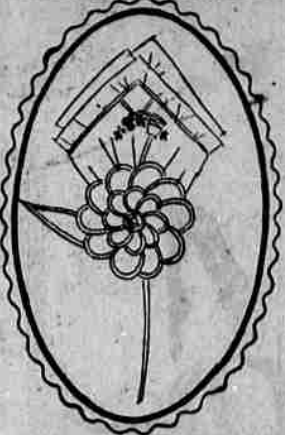

Only women who served on the general federation board before 1900 are eligible. Mrs. Jones was a director. Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary)
Breakfast—Fresh strawberries, corned, thin cream, sour cream waffles, maple syrup, milk, coffee. Lunch—Asparagus custard in cases, cream, and fruit salad, brown bread, milk, tea.

Dinner—Pheasant of lamb, twice baked potatoes, dandelion greens with lemon sauce, rhubarb bread

pudding, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

The bread pudding is suggested as the dinner dessert as a means of using the crumbs left from the crustacea prepared for the luncheon. Since the whole dinner is planned with a bread pudding in mind the meal is well balanced and palatable.

The asparagus recipe may be new to you. Any way, it's worth using.

Asparagus Custard in Cases
Small rolls are used to form the cases. If tiny, two should be allowed for each serving. Cut a neat slice across the top, removing the crust. Scoop out the crumbs from the centers and brush over with melted butter. Put into a slow oven to become crisp.

Two bunches asparagus, 2 cups milk, 4 eggs, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, paprika.

Wash and scrape asparagus and cut into inch pieces. Put aside the heads and put remaining pieces into a smooth sauce pan. Pour over boiling water to half cover. Cover pan and cook until water is evaporated. Add heads and milk and simmer ten minutes. Beat eggs slightly with salt, pepper and butter and stir into hot milk. Cook just below the boiling point until mixture coats the spoon. This can be cooked over a low fire, stirring constantly or over hot water just as any boiled custard is cooked. Fill crustacea with the asparagus custard, pouring any left over and around the rolls. Sprinkle with paprika and serve.
