Wallawa high team scored second with 28.5 and Joseph was third with 15.5.

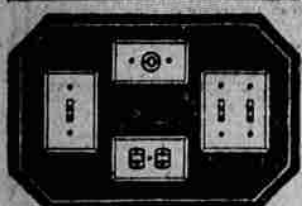

**Dr. Frederick Henry Baetjer Daring Demon That Has Slain Many of His Co-Workers.**

BALTIMORE, May 5. (AP)—Dr. Frederick Henry Baetjer, professor of Roentgenology at Johns Hopkins Medical School, is back at work after a long absence. He was the victim of a "demon" that has slain many of his co-workers in Roentgenology. One of the last to die was Prof. J. B. Roentgen, an outstanding authority whose work had been contemporary with Dr. Baetjer's. Surgeons see a like rate awaiting the Johns Hopkins professor—but he goes on displaying his contempt for the X-ray's death threat in writing whimsical rhymes and jingles.

**Daring the Demon.** Dr. Baetjer is daring a demon that has slain many of his early co-workers in Roentgenology. One of the last to die was Prof. J. B. Roentgen, an outstanding authority whose work had been contemporary with Dr. Baetjer's. Surgeons see a like rate awaiting the Johns Hopkins professor—but he goes on displaying his contempt for the X-ray's death threat in writing whimsical rhymes and jingles.

In common with his associates, Dr. Baetjer engaged in Roentgenological research when knowledge of the ray and its potency was in its infancy. It was some time after the discovery of the X-ray that its effect on the human body began to be understood, and in those pioneer days neither the screens which today protect X-ray operators, nor the need for them, was known. While a patient undergoing X-ray treatment would be exposed to the ray for only a fraction of a second, the early day operators were subjected to the ray's full power for long periods. They suffered severely or paid with their lives for the knowledge that has contributed much to the present day safety of X-ray control.

**Began Work in 1901.** Dr. Baetjer began his experiments in 1901, immediately after his graduation from Johns Hopkins Medical School. In a few months the ray had started on a course of destructive burns. In its inefficiency, the effect of exposure to the ray was not understood. In those pioneer days neither the screens which today protect X-ray operators, nor the need for them, was known. While a patient undergoing X-ray treatment would be exposed to the ray for only a fraction of a second, the early day operators were subjected to the ray's full power for long periods. They suffered severely or paid with their lives for the knowledge that has contributed much to the present day safety of X-ray control.

## WATSON GIVEN INDIANA VOTE

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., May 5. (AP)—James E. Watson, veteran of many Indian battle battles was victorious in another engagement yesterday when he vanquished in the republican primary Charles Adams, an Indianapolis attorney, who was his sole opponent for the long term senatorial nomination.

For the republican short term nomination Senator Arthur H. Robinson, of Indianapolis, maintained a majority over four opponents. Without opposition Evans Woolen, Indianapolis banker, became the candidate for the democratic short term nomination which involved six candidates none of whom had the necessary majority on the face of the incomplete returns. In addition to voting for U. S. senatorial candidates, the voters recommended their preference for congressional, legislative and county officer seekers.

**TIMBER HITS HIGH.** KIAMATH FALLS, Ore., May 5. (AP)—New record prices for yellow pine timber were established here late yesterday when the Chiloquin Lumber company bid \$7.84 a thousand for ninety million feet offered for sale by the government. The timber is

located in the Klamath National Forest, and is to be cut by the Klamath Lumber company.
