**26-Round Boxing Card

Rocco Stramaglia, 175, Portland, evaded on matters with Buster Adams, Boise pugilist, last night when he won a ten-round decision over the Gem State scrapper in the headline event of a La Grande athletic club boxing card.

Once before, Buster defeated Rocco in ten rounds but last night the score was even. Rocco led most of the time and his decision was based upon several rounds superiority. In the second round the Portland leader pushed Buster's stomach, which is one of his vulnerable points, and for half a dozen frames, slowed him up while Rocco built up a commanding lead in points.

The fight was much faster than the first, and was devoid of the feeling out tactics that both resorted to before during the majority of the fight.

In the semi-final, Delmer Allen, 142, La Grande, had a rather hard time of it, but in the final round, he won by a unanimous decision. He was victorious in six other fights, which is one of his vulnerable points, and for half a dozen frames, slowed him up while Rocco built up a commanding lead in points.

The first three rounds were about even, with Stolz doing a fair share of the leading, and Allen coming back with a rock of punches.

During the last of the group, however, Allen had his amazing adversary from Central Oregon carefully watching an assortment of blows.

In the six-round special Carl Becker, La Grande, and Ralph Wright, Baker, fought a draw, Becker, while lacking the punch that Wright displayed, stopped the Copper City boy around enough to keep the fight on even terms. Becker showed improvement over his last appearance here.
