

WEATHER COLD OVER COUNTY

SUMMERVILLE, Ore., May 7. (Special)—Foothill ranchers report Wednesday night a cold enough to have frozen a sheet of ice about 1/4 of an inch thick, north of here. Will Sanderson discovered ice on his place yesterday morning, although his brother, David L. Sanderson, whose ranch is near by, said open pools of water in the road near his place did not freeze, perhaps because a low fog hung about the premises early in the morning.

RAIN HINDERS SPRAYING
IMBRIER, May 7. (Special)—Wednesday night was quite cold here, J. Arch Furman finding half an inch of ice in his back yard. The apple orchards on his place were sufficiently advanced, however, that the trees were not damaged in the least.

For the past three days spraying has been most difficult due to the intermittent showers. In some cases the sprayed liquid did not have the required half hour in which to "set" before the rains washed it from the plants and buds, necessitating much repeat work.

Capon Demand Heeded J. G. Anson, Telocaset

TELOCASET, Ore., May 7. (Special)—James G. Anson, whose ranch adjoins the O.-W. tracks south of here, is starting this week on an experiment with caponized poultry stock. As the first step Mr. Anson is making capons of 12 one-pound stock roosters of Barred Rock strain. He has 150 other chicks from which he will later segregate the males for caponizing. Mr. Anson has learned that the most of capons is in greater demand in the various markets, beside the fact that a capon will "mother" a brood of chicks quite as carefully and efficiently as an old setting hen.
