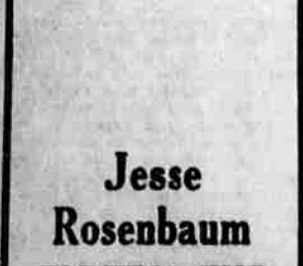

EMULATE MARQUARD?



"LEFTY" GROVES

Back in 1905 the New York Giants paid \$11,000 for South-paw Babe Marquard of Indianapolis. He was the sensation of the minors, the star of the American Association. His debut was most disappointing. The scribenes referred to him as the "11,000 lemon." In his first full season, 1909, the best he could do was win five and lose 12. The following year he broke even, with four wins and four losses. Marquard struck his stride in 1911, winning 24 and losing only seven. In 1912 he won 19 straight games, equalling a world record. After he once found himself, Marquard struck around for 13 seasons and has been one of the most valuable left-handers in the National league. Connie Mack is hopeful that "Lefty" Groves will emulate the deeds of Babe Marquard after a debut equally disappointing. "Lefty" Groves was the biggest bust of 1925 in the majors. He cost Connie Mack \$100,000 and wasn't worth one-tenth of that amount. What does the future hold for Groves? In the career of Babe Marquard Mack sees hope of ultimate success.

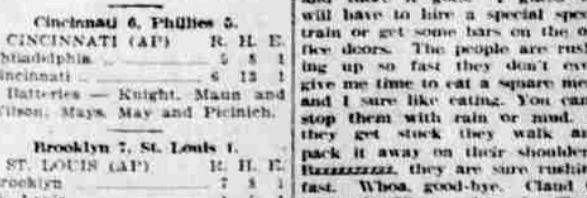

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OREGON TEAMS WIN DEBATES

SALEM, Mass. May 8. (AP)—The high school debating team from Salem, Ore., defeated the local high school team here last night in a debate on the subject "Resolved: That the child labor amendment as submitted by congress should be ratified." The Oregonians upheld the negative. The judges vote was two to one for the westerners. The debate was held in the Salem high school auditorium where the stage was decorated with the colors of both schools and a sign welcoming the Oregon visitors.

SALEM, Ore. May 8. (AP)—The Salem Oregon, high school debate team triumphed over the Salem, Mass., team here last night by a unanimous decision of the judges. The question was: "Resolved, that the child labor amendment as submitted by congress to the states should be adopted."

Governor Pierce presided, and an audience of 1200 persons waited anxiously while the decisions of the three judges were being received and opened by the governor. What the result was announced there was an outburst of cheering but many persons in the audience expected the Massachusetts team to get the decision. When the governor made the second announcement, "Your Salem, Oregon team in the east has carried the decision two to one," the cheering became deafening.

CONDITION OF WHEAT

WASHINGTON, May 8. (AP)—The wheat condition was 54.9 per cent of a normal on May 1, indicating a total production of 545,900,000 bushels on the estimated area to be harvested, the department of agriculture today announced. Production last year was 398,486,000 bushels and the 10-year average is 557,662,000 bushels. The winter wheat area to be harvested is about 37,655,000 acres or 5.6 per cent less than planted last autumn and 18.2 per cent more than the area harvested last year, which was 51,269,000 acres. The 10-year average amount to May 1, is 13.0 per cent.
