Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary)

Breakfast — Sliced pineapple, crisp broiled bacon, fried cornmeal mush, apple syrup, coffee.

Luncheon — Stuffed onions, lettuce sandwiches, prune whip, milk, tea.

Dinner — Broiled porterhouse steak, mashed potatoes, creamed carrots, May salad, whole wheat bread, strawberry puff milk coffee.

Two lunches asparagus, 4 tablespoons, French dressing, 2 sliced canned pineapple or equivalent in fresh, 3 tablespoons broken English walnut meats, 1/2 cup diced celery, mayonnaise, lettuce.

Wash and scrape asparagus and tie in small bunches. Cook heads out of water for fifteen minutes. Lay flat in water and cook ten minutes longer or until tender.

Drain, mix and chill. Pour over French dressing and let stand on ice for one hour. Cut pineapple in dice, combine with celery and nuts and add mayonnaise to make very moist. Arrange the asparagus in neat piles on crisp lettuce and pour over the mayonnaise mixture.

If the asparagus is the short thick variety a most attractive salad is made if the stalks are piled up "log cabin" fashion on a bed of lettuce. The mayonnaise mixture is then dropped in the center of the "cabin."
