"Moana," Tale of The Tropics, Called Magnificent

Every once in a while a picture comes to town which can truly be called "Different." Such is the case with "Moana," the new Paramount picture showing at the Arcade theatre today and Tuesday.

Made by Robert Flaherty, a director known principally because of the success of his earlier film, "Nanook of the North," it brings to the screen a narrative of real people in much the same way as Conrad or a Stevenson might have wished it. "Moana" pictures the life of a people on the island where Robert Louis Stevenson is believed to have lived and died.

It has been taken without any of the false sentiment or so-called "hokum" usually found in the ordinary film. It would be a gross misstatement to call "Moana" "just the same old thing."

Instead of American denizens of Hollywood we have a cast of natives. Instead of large Klieg lights, we are shown a magnificent sun, instead of hand-painted scenery, with studio walls for a background, one sees gorgeous tropical foliage, so typical of that far off island Paradise.

The leading character, Moana, is not a product of civilization. He is a son of the tribal chief, idol of the village youth. We follow him in his daily life, and are shown the ordeal through which every Samoan boy has to go before entering on his accepted place as a man in the councils of the leaders. This consists of a week, passed in the hands of a master tattooer. His bare back and sides are pierced by bone needles during seven days and seven nights. Outside, the villagers dance and feast. Inside, his mother
