BURIAL PLANS MADE

NEW YORK, May 11. (AP)—Funeral of Alton B. Parker, former chief judge of the court of appeals and candidate for president on the democratic ticket in 1904, who died yesterday, will be held tomorrow at St. Thomas' Protestant Episcopal church. Interment will be in Parker family plot at Kingston, N. Y., the lower Catskills, where Judge Parker spent his youth.

Among the honorary pallbearers will be Charles E. Hughes and John W. Davis.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 11. (AP)—The plea of a United States prosecutor saved a woman from a six-months jail sentence in federal court today.

On her plea of guilty to a charge of interstate auto theft, Judge Wolverton sentenced Mrs. Florence Cope, former librarian of the Carnegie library at Klamath Falls, to serve six months in jail.

He also sentenced George Edwards Cope, her husband, to three years in McNeil prison on each of two guilty pleas to indictments charging auto theft but allowed the sentences to run concurrently.

When he sentenced Mrs. Cope, he ordered that her sentence should begin at the expiration of a six months jail sentence she now is serving in jail on charges of passing bad checks. She has already served two months of that time.

Assistant U. S. Attorney McOlligrist, prosecutor, was on his feet immediately with a plea for the woman.

When he had finished speaking Judge Wolverton changed the sentence to four months and allowed it to run concurrently with the present sentence. That amounted to wiping the new sentence out altogether.

McOlligrist declared that although Mrs. Cope had taken all the blame when she pleaded guilty to the bad check charge and had also pleaded guilty to the auto theft charge without trying to palliate the offense, he believed that she had committed the offense on the prompting of her husband and to get food and clothing for her three children.

"I believe she is innocent of any criminal intent," he declared. The leniency which McOlligrist asked for the wife did not extend to the husband.

Missing Millionaire May Be Gang Victim

NEW YORK, May 11. (AP)—Walter S. Ward, missing millionaire, has fallen the victim of a bolded gang vengeance for slaying Clarence Peters in 1922, in the belief of Ralph D. Ward, a brother. Officers are searching for Walter Ward, in New York, New Jersey and Maryland.

When Walter was tried in White Plains for murdering Peters he claimed self defense, saying the slain marine was a member of a blackhand gang and threatened him with death unless he paid \$75,000. Ward was tried twice

and acquitted the second time. Assumpsink Creek, near the Trenton, N. J., where the missing man's auto was found last Thursday with a windshield broken and a rock laying on the front seat, was dragged yesterday but nothing significant was found, and the Trenton police gave up the search on theory that he was missing for reasons best known to himself.

Narcotic in Food Is Cause of Boy's Death

SILO CITY, Iowa, May 11. (AP)—A narcotic in food intended for a woman, held in jail on a charge of possessing drugs, but acted by several messenger boys, probably caused the death of Louis De Jure, 12, coroner J. H. Robbins de-

clared. Alfred Korh, husband of the woman is under arrest.

Late Sunday a messenger was sent with sandwiches and coffee for Mrs. Korh. Fearing that narcotics might be smuggled in to eat in this way, officials refused delivery and the messenger boy divided the spoils with his fellow workers.

Escaped Woman Convict Captured in Open Field

SYRACUSE, N. Y., May 11. (AP)—Rain-drenched, hungry and wretchedly cold, Lillian McDowell, the "cat-eye Annie" of numerous spectacular jewel thefts who escaped from Auburn prison early yesterday was recaptured at daylight one mile northeast of Weedsport.

She was found in an open field, partly hidden in a pile of weeds and brush which she had collected to protect her from the cold and rain. Still clad in her prison uniform of blue and white gingham, she appeared to have suffered greatly from exposure during her 24 hours' flight. She said she walked to Weedsport yesterday eight miles, without once being challenged.
