CHERRY PRICE SEVEN CENTS

Cannery prices of Royal Ann cherries have finally been fixed for the season at seven cents or \$140 a ton to the grower and Milton-Freewater, Walla Walla, Lewiston and Cove growers have closed contracts at that figure, declares K. J. Stackland, Cove orchardist.

He added that while canneries are paying the same price at Walla Walla valley points, they are still buying cherries in small lots at 6 cents a pound around Portland and in Clark county, Washington.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 11. (AP)—Live stock values were fully maintained today at the North Portland yards with some lines up a fraction. Sheep and lambs were the exception, ranging barely steady to weak.

In the dairy list prime first cubes are at a half cent at 37½ cents. Other grades are unchanged but the market is firm, considering the heavy production. California shipments are keeping the surplus down here. On the dairy exchange extras are quoted at 28 cents, standards and prime firsts 37½ cents and firsts 36½ cents. Prints remain at the 41 cent level with fat bids at 41 cents Portland at 39 to 40 cents in the country. The fresh egg market remains firm at ruling prices. No change is shown in board quotations for the day. Exchange prices: Extras 27 cents; firsts 26½; mediums 24 and current receipts 24½.

Country dressed meats are gradually moving out at steady prices. Pork receipts are very light and choice light hogs bring 18 to 18½

cents. Fancy calves sell at 14½ to 15 cents with the demand largely for top veal. Ordinary calves selling down to 14 cents.

With the exception of small, immature broilers, the local poultry market is in a very strong position with hardly enough live stuff coming to meet the requirements. Buyers bidding 25 to 28 cents for hens and up to 28 cents for broilers over two pounds. Colored breeds bringing a premium but light broilers down to 20 and 22 cents.

A firmer tone is shown in the old onion market. Although there has been no actual advance here brown onions are stiffening in the southern markets. San Francisco is quoting \$1.65 to \$2 for stock repacked out of the coolers. Old crop Sherwood stock is selling at \$2.50 to \$2.75 in the local wholesale market with not enough trading in the country now to establish a definite buying price. Recent bids were around \$1.75 to \$2 for U. S. No. 1 yellow danvers.

Outside shipments are keeping local berry prices high, although receipts are increasing every day. Growers received \$2.75 to \$3.25 on the early market today. Jobbers are moving out carload lots to Washington markets.

The wholesale sugar market is 10 cents per hundred higher today.

Stock Prices Turn Up in Early Trading

NEW YORK, May 11. (AP)—Stock prices turned upward after an early period of irregularity today under the stimulus of easier money rates and cable dispatches indicating a more hopeful outlook regarding an early settlement of the British general strike. The volume of trading was only little more than half that of yesterday, total sales in the first three hours falling below 600,000 shares.

Motors had another sinking spell during the morning on further selling inspired by rumors of further price cuts but they stiffened later when it became apparent that bear traders were not forcing the liquidation of much long stock. The approach of the General Motors meeting with prospect of a substantial cash extra, also helped to keep selling in check.
