Frosh-Rook Relay Meet To Be Held at O. A. C.

EUGENE, Ore., May 12. (AP)—Sixteen track men, to compete in the annual frosh-rook relay carnival, were named yesterday by Earl Leslie, coach of the University of Oregon freshmen. The meet will be held at O. A. C. on the home field of the rooks. Five teams will be entered.

Entries for the frosh in both the 440 relay and the half mile relay will be picked from Fred Cheshire, Arthur Ord, Louis McGee, Joe Stannard, George Burnett and Alex Scott. Two of these men will have to run in both events.

The mile relay team will be composed of the following five runners: Joe Stannard, Jack Jones, Bill Haggerty, Bill Craddock and Nelson. The one who doesn't participate in this event will run the quarter mile.

The three mile relay team will be composed of two half miles and two miles. Ernest McErick, Rumar Hanson and David Shuman are the half miles on hand and Harold Lacey, Edwin Jensen and Robert Hill are on hand for the mile work. The two runners in this group not used in the three mile event will be used in the half mile relay.

Joe Pate, who won 20 games for Atz last season is now with the Philadelphia Athletics. He recently made his major league debut at 33 years of age by defeating Washington.

"Lefty" Johns, now a member of the Detroit Tigers, won the same number and lost only eight games, four less than Pate. Johns also won his first start against Cleveland.

Losing two pitchers who turned in 40 victories last season seems to have upset Fort Worth's pennant strategy. During the first three weeks of play the club has floundered around the cellar.

Atz, who has won six straight pennants in the Texas league for Fort Worth and five Dixie series in the same time from the pennant winners of the Southern association, is having mainly rough sailing. No wonder he is singing:
