

# GOVERNOR OF IDAHO IN CITY

La Grande was unsuspecting host to the governor of Idaho, a past governor and several other notables of the panhandle state this noon. The gubernatorial party arrived without bells, ate its collective luncheon at the Foley hotel, and took its leave with the same lack of ostentation.

The visitors were on their way from Boise to Lewiston, and they had to drive through both Oregon and Washington to get there. Governor Gov. and Mrs. C. C. Moore and Ex-Governor D. W. Davis, who is now secretary of finance in the reclamation bureau at Washington, D. C., the two-car caravan included Lloyd Adams, of Lexburg, editor of the Standard, and secretary to Senator Gooding; State Senator M. B. Yeaman, editor of the Idaho Falls Times-Tribune; Captain R. A. Jeter, secretary of state; John McMurray, state chairman of the Republican party in Idaho; Dr. W. C. Nye, of Boise, state veterinarian; Mr. Guerin, of Orofino, district attorney in Clearwater county, and Miss H. Thompson, editor of the Idaho Statesman.

The celebration of the completion of the dam and lumber mill project is the principal object of their tour, but they plan to attend a number of political conferences en route.

Governor Moore, who is finishing his second term this year, is not a candidate for nomination to succeed himself. Both McMurray and Captain Jeter are mentioned as his possible successors. Yeaman, it is reported, would not be averse to filling the lieutenant-governor's chair.
