## Baker and La Grande Teams Both Confident

### Tigers and Bulldogs Expected to Fight It Out Annual Track Honors.

Although Baker high school is figuring on taking first honors tomorrow in the annual Eastern Oregon track and field meet at Pendleton local sport fans are confident that the champion Tigers will win the meet by a fair margin.

Captain Sherwood and Tubby Zundel between them should gather in the neighborhood of 20 or more points and the other members of the squad should make at least two-score markers to post their figure. And 40 points is usually enough to take first honors.

Sherwood is favored to win the discus, place in the shot and low hurdles and possibly in the sprints. Zundel is expected to score high in the high jump, the hurdles and the sprints, and may take first place in any of these events.

Many Strong Contenders  
Lyman is a strong contender in the pole vault and a first by him would not be surprising. Davis and Brown are expected to add more points in the distance races and Snuts and McKennon may both score points in the quarter mile. McKennon also looks good in the hurdles.

Keown is a strong contender in the javelin broad jump and sprints and the La Grande relay team has an even chance to win first.

Posters here figure that the Tigers have a chance to score in every event and should score heavily in at least seven or eight of the 24.

Several Teams Entered  
To date Hermiston, Pendleton, Union, La Grande and Baker are entering teams at Pendleton Saturday and other schools are expected to be represented. Whether central Oregon will send a team this year is uncertain.

Baker and La Grande will send 10 men each to the meet. Whether this is an unlucky number for the Bulldogs or the Tigers remains to be seen. They are relying upon selected points in the track events to win the meet and also hope to place high in the broad jump. McKennon is reported to have been jumping more than 21 feet. Payne and Alkin have thrown the javelin around 150 feet during the last week's practice. It is said Duff is expected to star in the pole vault and Stoddard in the half mile.

Lines looked upon as a possibly point getter in the discus and broad jump.

Pendleton Has Two Aces  
Pendleton is relying mainly upon Allen and Hatton to gather points. The negro is a likely winner in the high hurdles, high jump,

and broad jump and Hatton figures strongly in the discus, shotput and javelin.

Union is losing her hopes on Fugit, in the shot and discus. Mays in the quarter and half mile, Richards and Baxter in the mile and Brown in the sprints. It is doubtful if Johnny Gervin, pole vaulter, broad jumper and hurdler, will be able to compete because of an injured ankle, sprained in the Union county meet.

Preliminaries in Morning  
What Hermiston has is unknown here but a strong team is indicated.

Preliminaries in the Eastern Oregon meet will open at 10 o'clock Saturday morning. No preliminaries will be run off in the mile, half mile, quarter and relay.
