THE LITTLE PEDESTRIANS.

Many rules have been given to drivers for the protection of children; and goodness knows, they need them. Here are some for parents, from a traffic expert:

1. Don't let your children play in the street.
2. Don't let them walk in the street.
3. Don't let them cross a street in any other place than an intersection.
4. Don't let them run across a street; make them walk.
5. Don't let them play near congested streets or intersections.

These rules are more easily given than enforced. Children are naturally heedless, and they make a peculiarly difficult traffic problem because a driver never can tell what they will do. But while the conscientious driver is doing his best to look out for a sudden irruption of children across his path, parents surely can do no less than try to hammer these elementary rules of caution into the children's minds. Repetition eventually will succeed, and carefulness become habitual.

THE HEART OF THE STRIKE.

That British general strike was purported to be about the British coal mining situation. The other trades all said they merely struck in sympathetic support of the miners, because the latter were locked out to make them accept the terms of the mine owners. Those terms combined lower wages and longer hours.

The thing was not really so simple as this. There was evidence of a widespread desire on the part of organized British labor to force a show-down and prove its power. Also a desire on the part of British capitalistic and conservative classes to make an impressive demonstration of their power. Each side hoped to establish its supremacy. The tragedy of the situation was that the two sides seemed about equally watched. In this wide extension of the conflict, the miners and their claims were almost lost sight of. On the face of figures from London, the million or so British coal miners plainly deserved sympathy. Their wages, up to the beginning of the big strike, ran from \$8 to \$17 a week for able-bodied miners, depending on the district. At best, that is little to support a family on. The average British miner's pay, in purchasing power, has been one-third as much as the average American miner's. And the mine owners' proposals would have reduced this low wage by \$3 or \$4 a week. The other trades were generally criticized, in this country, for butting in and turning the troubles of one industry into a national issue. But an average American will find it hard to blame those coal miners.

Little wonder, therefore, that the announced settlement of the strike is acclaimed the work of a merciful God, a boon to hordes of suffering human beings. Both sides will show much good sense in ending the quabble without further ado.
