Strawberries dropped to 20 cents

within a short time.

WOOL REPORT

BOSTON, May 14. (AP)—The
Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will
say:

"While the wool trade has one
less problem to consider, with the
settlement of the British general
strike the outlook is by no means
a happy one even yet. Locally the
market has been dead and dull and
what business has been done has
been rather unsatisfactory on the whole,
although not altogether without
profit. The manufacturers, how-
ever, are not having a happy time
at best and profits are exceedingly
narrow.

"In the west there is moderate
activity as the wool is short at
prices which show little or no
change, some growers refusing still
to meet the market.

"Bradford expects the resump-
tion of the colonial wool auction
in London next week, although no
definite announcement has yet been
made. The following primary mar-
kets are without material change.
"Mohair is firm. Some further
business for America is reported
at the cape.

"The rail and water shipments of
wool from Boston from January 1,
1926 to May 13, 1926, inclusive,
were 77,456,000 pounds against 58-
518,000 pounds for the same pe-
riod last year. The receipts from
January 1, 1926 to May 13, 1926 in-
clusive were 149,798,057 pounds
against 117,745,800 pounds for the
same period last year.

EGGS DROP ON MARKET TODAY

PORTLAND, Ore., May 14. (AP)—
Fresh eggs are down again on
the local board with a decline of 1c
on standard extra and half a
cent on current receipts. Today's
quotations are: Extras 25c; firsts
26c; mediums 24c and current re-
ceipts 24 1/2c.

Receipts yesterday were 2194
cases, 1205 cases going into the
cooler and bringing the total hold-
ings up to 36,530 cases.

Country dressed veal is weak
and lower with choice light stuff
now down to 14 cents. Real fancy
will still bring a half cent premium
but the bulk of offerings slow at
12 1/2 cents. Receipts are plentiful
but not unusually heavy. Demand
has fallen off. Choice light hogs
are firm and scarce with the few
arrivals going out promptly at 13
to 14 1/2 cents along Front street.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 14. (AP)—
Strawberries continued their up-
ward swing on the early growers
market today with receipts the
lightest this week. Less than 400
crates were brought in today being
mostly Gold Dollars, but they
cleaned up promptly at \$2.50 to
\$2.25 a crate. Growers apparently
held off anticipating a big demand
and with good picking weather to-
day receipts are expected to be
heavy tomorrow.

Peach Growers Will
Hold Out for \$50 Ton

MARYSVILLE, Cal., May 14.
(AP)—Peach growers, repre-
senting an 18,000-ton annual out-
put met here last night and voted
unanimously to accept not less than
\$50 a ton for their crop this year.
The price last year ranged as low
as \$35 a ton and many of the
growers said they would be forced
out of their orchards if the same
price prevailed this year. The
growers represent what is known
as the Varden Pool which is pledged
to Bluff-Grubbe and com-
pany. But the concern will be
given first call only at the \$50 min-
imum set last night.

The Northern California peach
growers' association—representing
55,000 tons has agents in the field
today signing up growers to accept
not less than the \$50 minimum.
The California Peach Growers' as-
sociation representing considerable
tonnage will meet in San Francisco
on next Monday to consider the
minimum price acceptable to its
membership.

The total peach crop in Cal-
ifornia in 1925 was said to have
been 245,000 tons.

Wheat Values Decline;
Crop Reports Cause

CHICAGO, May 14. (AP)—
Wheat values lost largely today on
general selling due largely to more
favorable crop reports from the
northwest and from the southwest
as well. Declines in wheat prices
were especially noticeable in the
late dealings, owing partly to the
fact that a cargo of Duluth wheat
is due here around May 26 and
that a cargo of Canadian wheat is
also coming presumably to be de-
livered on May contracts here. Corn
and oats turned easy at the last,
sympathizing with wheat trade in
the two feed grains being almost
exclusively local today.

Wheat closed unsettled 3/4 to
1 1/2c net lower, corn unchanged to
1/2c off and oats varying from 1/2c
decline to 1/2c gain.

CHICAGO, May 14. (AP)—With
indications at hand that rains had
allayed fear as to at least the im-
mediate outlook for the spring
crop, prices turned downward to-
day in the early dealings. Wheat
opening prices 1/2c off to 1/2c up,
were followed by a moderate gen-
eral setback.
