NORGE FLIGHT HEROIC BATTLE

The explorer said he dropped an American flag at the pole, making the third time the colors of the United States had been placed there. Peary and Byrd having previously placed them there.

The Norge was being dismantled at Teller, 75 miles northwest of here, where it landed last Thursday night, ending its flight from Spitzbergen. Colonel Umberto Nobile, of Italy, designer and builder of the blimp, was supervising the dismantling. Two other members of the expedition besides Roald Amundsen and Ellsworth were here awaiting a steamer to the states. These are Captain Oscar Wisling and Lieutenant Oskar Omdahl. The four arrived here in a launch from Teller yesterday.

Despite the rather chilly reception accorded the four explorers because of their failure to land here instead of at Teller, Ellsworth, the only American in the expedition said today he was enjoying himself. He is a typical American, enjoys frontier life and is well known here.

The four men are staying at a log cabin which has been named "The Explorers' Club of Nome." The explorers said they slept little on the flight. They said the blimp's gondola was too small to permit the men to lie down.

DETROIT, May 17 (AP)—The board of control of the Detroit Arctic expedition today telegraphed Captain George H. Wilkins, commander of the expedition at Point Barrow, Alaska, to carry on his flight.

"The main results of the Byrd and Amundsen expeditions have been published and do not seem to necessitate any change in the plans of the Detroit Arctic expedition, or to lessen the importance of its central objective—to discover land and plant on it the American flag," the message sent by Edward S. Evans, general manager, stated.

ted. It is learned authoritatively. About five hundred persons were killed and one thousand wounded. So far as could be learned today, no Americans lost their lives. The American embassy is receiving hundreds of cable messages from Polish Americans inquiring as to the fate of relatives.

That so many civilians, including women and children, were among those killed or wounded is explained solely on the ground that instead of running for cover when shots were heard, the people got within range in their attempts to see what was going on.

SITUATION IN LONDON EASIER

LONDON, May 17. (AP)—Although most industries are steadily recovering from the effects of the general strike only one railroad system was able to give full service today. Other railroad companies announced that they were unable to give more than fifty per cent of normal service.

The post offices are congested. Parcel post service was suspended entirely during the strike and when the workers began to go back, and it was announced that parcels again would be accepted, the packages came in such numbers that the depots were snowed under. Strong hope is held that the miners' dispute will be settled but it will be several days before preliminary arrangements can be made. Meanwhile coal supplies for the railroads and industries are steadily dwindling. The proposals outlined by premier Baldwin must be explained to the miners before their assent can be obtained while the mine owners are still to be heard from. Some operators notably in south Wales are said to regard the premier's proposals unfavorably.

WOULD REMOVE CHIEF'S BODY

A movement for the removal of the body of Chief Joseph from the Colville Indian reservation back to the town of Joseph, in Wallawa county, the old stamping ground of the chief, was discussed at an impromptu meeting of officers of the Oregon Trail association Saturday at Baker.

The movement originated at Enterprise, Wallawa county, some time ago and officers of the Oregon Trail association have volunteered assistance in the matter. The consent of the department of Indian affairs in Washington D. C. is necessary before any action is taken.

When the Northwest Indian congress is held in Spokane in June friends of the movement will have an opportunity to present their plans. A. W. Nelson secretary of the Oregon-Trail association, said this morning. The commissioner of Indian affairs of Washington D. C. will be in attendance at the congress. A sign, directing traffic over the Old Oregon Trail, to be constructed at Grande, is also being planned by the officers of the Oregon Trail association. Since the John Day highway is almost completed, efforts are being made to direct the traffic over that highway.

Young Man Fined For "Borrowing" An Auto

Roy Hogue, 19, was fined \$15 by Justice Hugo E. Brady this morning for taking a car without the owner's permission.

"Only the fact that the owner was your brother-in-law saves you from a jail sentence," added his honor, as he passed judgment. "But it amounts to the same thing," was the prisoner's deplorable reply, as he indicated his readiness to square the debt at two dollars the day in jail.

Wade Shelton, who was to have been tried today on a charge of drunken driving, was excused from appearance until June 10 because of illness in his family. His brother, Charles Shelton, of Baker, and Henry L. Hess will represent him. Two fines of five dollars and costs each were imposed by Judge Brady on two violators of the lights adjustment law, Lynn Bohnenkamp and W. J. Stewart.

Tubby Zundel all around performance racked with Sherwood. Zundel was high point man of the meet with 154 points and Sherwood was one point behind him. Sherwood was disqualified in the low hurdles because he stopped from his lane and ran over an extra hurdle or he would have been high point man with 174 points.

Zundel won the high jump at 5 feet 9 inches and Lyman went over the bar at 10 feet 8 inches in the pole vault. Both Lyman and Hamilton attempted to better the Eastern Oregon record of 11 feet 3 inches. Lyman barely failing.

Smuts Steps Quarter Mile

Smuts clipped off the quarter mile in 53.5 seconds for first place and the La Grande relay team outdistanced all competitors in the relay event.

La Grande's win Saturday gives her permanent possession of the trophy cup, the second team in history to win this distinction. Baker's showing in the meet was a surprise to many, especially to those who believed the Bulldogs were as ferocious as they had been touted by Baker newspapers. Despite upsets in the low hurdles, broad jump and discus, which lost La Grande probably a dozen points, Baker was back in the race a total of 25 points. Had Union had Johnny Geertsen, pole vaulter, hurdler and broad jumper, in competition, Union would undoubtedly have taken a third and shoved Baker into fourth.
