Intimate glimpses of a native village and a Boer household make us feel thoroughly at home. Romance, adventure, and comedy—the eternal triangle of good entertainment—are pleasingly combined in "The Empire Builders," playing at the Sherry theater today only.

"Police Patrol" Opens Engagement At The Star

"The Police Patrol" which opens a two day engagement at the Star theater today is a screen production that may be safely recommended to photoplay patrons of all ages and viewpoints. The picture bears the well known Gotham trademark and shows every evidence of being carefully prepared both as to story, direction and acting. The acting is especially well done, care of by such well known and capable artists as James Kirkwood, Edna Murphy, Edmund Breese and a host of others.

The spectator does not have to wait long for this photoplay to get into real action. The picture opens with a fine "shot" of New York's "finest" on parade, the hero is introduced and immediately he starts on things going by saving a child

from a runaway horse. Then the plot develops in a most interesting manner. The police hero meets and falls in love with the sister of the boy he had rescued. One night he intercepts a gang of thieves who are robbing a fur store. At the station is shown a picture of the notorious Dorothy Stone, a famous crook. It is his sweetheart's face. He is told to "bring her in." The outcome of this dramatic situation is too good to reveal in advance but suffice to say it is well worked out in a manner that is both logical and interesting.

The film abounds in tense moments and includes some very absorbing scenes showing the actual inner workings of the largest police department in the world, some of the most notable being, the famous police games, the N. Y. Harbor Patrol boat in action, a view of the intricate burglar alarm apparatus, morning inspection in the precinct station. "The Police Patrol" is most decidedly not a police propaganda picture but after seeing it one gains a much better impression of the officers of the law than before. It is good entertainment.
