STRAWBERRY PRICES SLUMP

PORTLAND, Ore., May 19. (AP)—Strawberry prices broke to the lowest level of the season on the early growers market this morning, when Improved Oregon sold as low as \$1.60 a crate. Receipts were also the heaviest of any day so far this season.

Loads began arriving at the market at 2:30 a. m. and by 4 o'clock it was impossible to get inside the market. Growers backed their trucks into the entrances and lined up along the curb.

Highest Sale \$2.10

Growers attempted to hold the market by asking \$2.25 but it was apparent right from the start that values were bound to break under the deluge of berries. Buyers would not even consider the \$2.25 level and it was fully a half hour before any berries were sold. Then some select Oregonians went at \$2.10. This was the highest sale of the day so far as is known. Later whole loads were taken at \$1.90 to \$2 with crates returned in some instances. In the final session fancy Oregonians were sold at \$1.70 a crate. Gold Dollars sold at \$1.50 to \$1.75 mostly \$1.50.

Selling at 10 Cents a Box. Many of the growers refused to sell their berries and hauled them to the canneries for 9 cents a pound. Others took their loads back home, declaring they would sell them from stands in front of their farms at 10 cents a box rather than accept ruling values.

The harvest is now at the peak and it is hardly likely that prices will work much lower, considering offers made by barrellers and canneries.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 19. (AP)—Country dressed meats steady and unchanged; choice light calves 14 to 14½ cents; choice light hogs 13½ to 14 cents.

Growers and holders of old potatoes, now generally recognize the situation as hopeless and are selling as rapidly as they can at \$1.50 per cwt. New potatoes from California are now down to 6 and 6½ cents. New Oregon potatoes are coming now. First offerings went at 5 to 10 cents.

Butter market slow and weak. A half cent decline to 26½ cents in cube firsts is the only change on the board. Receipts continue heavy. Live poultry easy with little activity in trading. Prices generally unchanged.

Receipts eggs are a half cent higher at 25 cents a dozen. Other grades are unchanged. The market is steady.

Wheat Prices Suffer Setback Late Today

CHICAGO, May 19. (AP)—Wheat prices underwent a material setback today in the late dealings, selling out on the part of early bidders revealed that the market was without adequate support, despite dry weather complaints from the northwest. Slowness of export demands at the seaboard was a bearish factor and so too was communications that Kansas City has sold wheat to come here for delivery on May contracts and that a wheat cargo from Duluth to Chicago was also en route.

Wheat closed irregular at 1c net decline to 14c advance; corn ¼ to ½c down; oats ½ to 1c off and provisions unchanged to 17c higher.
