red. Every Indian turned against him. Every Indian save one fine young buck, whom Whitman had loved and called by the Christian name of John.

The Indians banded together and crept through the night to the fort where Whitman, his family and helpers were living. John, who loved Whitman, knew that this meant certain death to the missionary. To leave the band and go to warn his friend was certain death. So he crept along with the others until they came to the fort.

His brother, Big Bear, the leader, was near the door when John sprang before him and spread out his arm barring the door. John cried, "Do not do it—spare him. He is a man as we are."

So surprised were all the Indians that they stopped for an instant, then as they began to understand, an angry growl came from each throat. Again John said, "Do not kill him." He trusted Big Bear. John believed by doing this that he could make Big Bear understand and that he would explain to the others.

Big Bear, hearing the other Indians' savage hiss, cried, "Stand back, or I shoot."

But the young brother did not stir. The Indians hissed louder than before.

For the last time, Big Bear cried, "Stand back or I shoot."

John did not stand back. Big Bear let fly his arrow.

John did not die. The arrow had broken his jaw bone but his cheek open back to his ear. The bone grew together but the cheek never did. For this reason all the white people ever after called him Cut-Mouth John.

Helped Settle Quarrels Always he was a friend of the whites. Helping in settling all quarrels between the other Indians and whites.

He scouted for the government over this entire Grande Ronde valley; helped blaze new trails and taught the people many Indian ways of hunting.

John took in payment for scouting one time an old worn officers uniform. This uniform he treasured more than any other thing.

Long after the Indians were placed on the reservation at Pendleton, John used to dress up in this suit on all state occasions.

The last year that Old Cut-Mouth John lived, he came to La Grande for this celebration. He was prouder and more important than ever, because the white people made such a fuss about him.

Many speeches were made that day, so when it came time for the Indians to sit down at the table the people asked John to speak.

He marched up and down among the food and dishes. Finally in a loud voice he said, "Fourth of July—George Washington—Cut-Mouth John—all same."

Cave-In Fatal to One Workman in Portland

PORTLAND, Ore., May 21. (AP)

A cave-in at the rear of the new Pacific building at Sixth and Yamhill streets, resulted late yesterday in the death of William Wyant and serious injuries to A. W. Lull, workmen employed by local contractors.

Wyant's body was not recovered for nearly an hour being buried under seven feet of dirt. He had been with the company but two days. Lull was taken from the cave-in twelve minutes after the accident and was revived by artificial respiration. He suffered from chest injuries but is expected to live.
