FISHER WINNER IN PRIMARIES

PHILADELPHIA, May 21 (AP)—Backed by the forces headed by Secretary Mellon, former state banking commissioner, John S. Fisher was leading Edward E. Beldeman for the Pennsylvania republican gubernatorial nomination by 16,573 votes.

Additional figures in the republican senatorial race slightly reduced the lead of congressman Vane, who maintained modification of the Volstead act was the paramount issue in the campaign.

With 285 districts missing the congressman had a parity over George Wharton Pepper of 88,448. Governor Clifford Pinchot was 171,639 behind Pepper, Pinchot and Pepper were classed as drys.

In the democratic gubernatorial contest Judge Eugene C. Bonnell of Philadelphia still maintained his lead of about one thousand over Judge Samuel E. Shull of Stroudsburg.

SALEM, Ore., May 21 (AP)—Voting was slow here today in the primary election, only about one-sixth of the registered voters having cast their ballots at 1 o'clock.
