**EGG'S VALUES HIGHER TODAY**

PORTLAND, Ore., May 21. (AP)—A healthier tone is shown in the local egg market with values higher on the exchange. Fresh standard firsts are now quoted on a parity with extras at 27 cents. Receipt eggs are also fractionally higher at 25 cents. Other grades are firm and unchanged.

Quotations on the local daily exchange are: Extras and firsts 27 cents; medium 24 cents and current receipts 25c.

Receipts continue fairly liberal with quality excellent for storing although dealers complain about arrivals reported yesterday amounted to 1720 cases. Out of amount 462 cases went into the cooler, bringing the local storage holdings up to 41,337 cases.

Shipping demand is moderate with a light movement to California and to the east.

While top grades of butter are still holding low, quality stock is weak and lower. Prime firsts are down a fraction at 37 cents. Receipts yesterday totaled 27,163 pounds with 27,274 pounds manufactured. Approximately 10,479 pounds were put into storage. Cooler holdings in Portland are almost double a year ago, due largely to the mild spring winter and the early onset of the season. Production is heavy but shipments to the south are helping to keep down the surplus here. Prints and fat bids are unchanged.

**Wheat Prices Broken In Seasonal Trading**

CHICAGO, May 21. (AP)—Rapid fluctuations in the price of May delivery of wheat signaled today the approach of the end of the season settlement of accounts. Offerings of May were of sufficient volume to break prices four cents temporarily. Wheat shipments from Omaha to Chicago were announced and rains both in the American and Canadian northwest tended further to weaken the values despite export business estimated at 800,000 bushels largely Canadian.

Wheat closed irregular 1/4c net lower to 1/2c advance, corn 3/4c to 1c up, oats unchanged to 1/2c higher, and provisions unchanged to 10c down.

**Stock Prices Climb Briskly in New York**

NEW YORK, May 21. (AP)—Responding to encouraging statements on the outlook for business by steel executives attending the semi-annual meeting of the American Iron and Steel Institute here, stock prices turned briskly upward today on buying spread over a broad list. Trading showed a substantial appreciation in volume, total sales in the first three hours running over 900,000 shares.

The recovery took place in the face of another stiffening of money rates, following the calling of about \$20,000,000 in bank loans.

Sharp rallies also took place in the French and Belgian currencies.

Prices in both sections show little actual change, although it must be said there is still a buyers' market. The trade however hopes that the policy of delayed buying on the part of clothing manufacturers will presently give way to a bigger volume of business in goods and with the mills lightly stocked with wool the reflection in the raw materials would be rather speedy."
