"Dance Madness" Is Fast Moving Tale

A few years ago the big dramatic features possessed beautiful sets, and many of these were done in doubtful taste. Now comedies, are produced with as great attention to detail as the dramas, and in "Dance Madness" the romantic faces at Sherry's, the colorful settings include New York, Carlo and Paris.

"Johnstown Flood" On Screen Makes Great Melodrama
