Union Meet Will Honor Graduates

Churches Set Aside Evening Services to Attend Baccalaureate Sermon by Dr. Parker.

Age will step deferentially aside and youth advance to the place of honor tomorrow, which is baccalaureate Sunday for the 23 boys and girls being graduated from the La Grande high school this spring. Not only are the churches foregoing their usual Sunday evening services in order that their congregations may assemble at the First Methodist church for sermon to the seniors, but several of the ministers are devoting their morning messages to the young people of their parishes.

The baccalaureate service is announced for 8 o'clock. Shortly before that hour, the graduates will form a double line for the formal procession to their seats before the altar. Their teachers and the members of the board of education will accompany them. Music for the march will be played on the organ by Mrs. A. E. Kinnman.

Just before the invocation, which will be pronounced by the Rev. J. A. Hall, pastor of the Methodist church, South, the congregation will rise to sing "America," led by the members of the choir. The Rev. Oliver Riley, rector of St. Peter's Episcopal church, will read the scripture lesson.

A glee club, representing both boys' and girls' choruses of the high school, will sing the anthem, "Oh, Sing to God" by Gounod. Mrs. J. A. Tedford will be accompanist. Dr. Henry W. Parker, pastor, will then deliver the baccalaureate sermon, for which he has chosen the theme, "The Uncharted Way." A hymn, led by the choir, and the benediction, which is to be asked by the Rev. C. V. Dunn, pastor of the Central Church of Christ, will conclude the service. During the recessional, Mrs. Kinnman will play another organ number.

First Presbyterian
"Life at Its Best" will be the theme of the sermon the Rev. William Crosby Ross, pastor, will preach at morning worship at 11 o'clock, when the 1924 graduates will be especially honored by their fellow church members. The quartet will sing the anthem, "The Woods and Every Sweet Smelling Tree" by West. Sunday school, preceding this service, will be at 9:45. A full attendance is expected at 4 p. m. and Intermediate at 7.

Central Church
Because of the high school service at the Methodist church, the Senior Endeavor society will meet at 8:30 p. m. Epworth League members have been invited to join the C. E. members.

The session of the Bible school, being at 9:45 a. m. Mrs. Dallas Green, superintendent, teachers and pupils are making preparations for Children's day, which will be observed either the first or the second Sunday in June. The men's Bible class meeting at the city hall, will study the deliverance of the Israelites from Egypt.

Men in general are invited to be present. Morning worship at 11 o'clock will include the second of three sermons by the pastor, the Rev. Mr. Dunn, on "The Lord's Supper." He will speak of the universal character of the institution, its simplicity, and discuss the question of who should partake of the emblems.

First Baptist
Every child attending the morning service tomorrow at the First Baptist church has been asked to try to learn the Lord's prayer for recitation. The Rev. George Albert Pollard, pastor, will talk to the children on the theme, "Saying the Lord's Prayer." To the grownups, his sermon subject will be "The Pilgrim's Plea."

Sunday school meets at 9:45 a. m., classes beginning immediately. The closing assembly is at 10:30. The men's class has its weekly session at 7 p. m., the pastor leading.

Methodist Church South
"Probation" is the subject that the Rev. Mr. Hall announces for his sermon at 11 a. m., at the Methodist Church South. Special music will supplement his message. Sunday school will start at 9:45.

Epworth League members will have their usual service at 6 p. m.

First Methodist
E. D. Towler will lead the study of the subject, "How to Deal With Aggression" at the meeting of the Men's forum at 9:45 a. m. Bible school has its session at the same hour.

At 11 o'clock, the congregation will gather for worship. An organ prelude will be played by Mrs. A. E. Kinnman, and the choir, under direction of Mrs. Sherwood Williams, will furnish the other musical numbers. Dr. Parker's sermon theme will be "The Overcoming Life."

Bean nomination for governor. The figures on the republican gubernatorial nomination from 1231 precincts were: Patterson, 48,922; Upton, 29,769; Carter, 16,949.

Watkins Pressing Hancy
Elton Watkins, former congressman, kept pressing Bert E. Hancy, former shipping board member, as additional returns were tabulated today. With 1153 precincts counted, Hancy had 12,702; Watkins, 11,751.

Governor Walter M. Pierce maintained his big lead for the democratic gubernatorial nomination over Mrs. Louise Palmer Weber, an avowed champion of modification of the Volstead act.

In 1170 precincts Pierce had 17,067; Weber 6,411. M. E. Crumacker, representative of the third congressional district, handily won the republican nomination. He had in 505 out of 522 precincts a total of 21,692. H. P. Mulkey had 9,614. Norman Richards who made a campaign on liquor law modifications had 5,552.
