NO 1926 DEFENSE DAY. This year there will be no National Defense Day. Any alarm aroused by the announcement may melt away after a little consideration.

It is not evident that much has been accomplished by making a special defense feature of Armistice Day or the Fourth of July. At any rate, the government hasn't been satisfied with the celebrations on those dates, and hasn't found enough interest in the matter to fix some other date.

This doesn't mean that the public isn't interested in national defense. It takes a lively interest in all practical aspects of military defense, and cheerfully pays what in former times would have been considered a crushing burden of taxation for the support of the army and navy and air service.

SEARCH AND SEIZURE. In the "administration bill" providing for more drastic prohibition enforcement, the senate committee has "softened" the provision dealing with search warrants for private homes.

As the search clause stands, it authorizes the search of private homes only when there has been issued an official search warrant based on information that liquor is being made in the home for commercial use.

"The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no warrants shall issue but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched and the persons or things to be seized."
