Two workmen piling lumber at the Grande Ronde yards across the river reported that they heard the crash of cars, and watched the bank into the stream. All six of the occupants were thrown from the car. Had they remained inside, it is believed they would all have drowned.

Mrs. Holmes apparently met instant death. Her body, examined by Dr. E. L. Halston, coronor, showed a broken neck and caved chest.

Mr. Adella, whose injuries were at first feared fatal, sustained a broken pelvic bone and several fractured ribs, in addition to several bruises. Death was not about the head. One of his ribs is broken, and his back is injured. However, his condition is not considered grave, his physician reports.
