## Author Advances Bold Theory in "High Steppers"

The theory that the leading of a jazz mad life in youth may possibly lead to a sober and prosperous maturity is advanced in "High Steppers," which comes to the Arcade theater Tuesday and Wednesday. It is an Edwin Carewe production for First National, featuring Mary Astor and Lloyd Hughes.

## "One of Bravest" Comes to Star Theater

## Presidential Order Aimed at California

WASHINGTON, May 25. (AP)—Bombaraded by criticism from both west and east, Assistant Secretary Andrews has assured the country he had no intention of authorizing state and county officials generally throughout the country to act as prohibition agents.

The government prohibition chief reiterated that President Coolidge's executive orders making such a function by state, county and city officials was intended for the present at least for California only.

He defended the presidential order, however, as entirely constitutional by conceding that it involved some aspects which might be "very dangerous."

The federal commissions to be given the local officials, he added, would be issued with the understanding that they are revocable at any time.

**DECISION AGAINST COMPANY**

NEW YORK, May 25. (AP)—The National Cash Register company infringed on forty-four patents owned by the Remington Cash Register company and will have to pay the latter company damages for losses sustained. It was decided here by Judge Manhattan of the circuit court of appeals.

## HEALTH

Headache is one of the most frequent symptoms mentioned by persons in ill health.

About thirty years ago the eyes were acknowledged as likely causes for many of the erratic pains in the head and uncertain nervous states. It is now known by the great mass of persons that properly prescribed glasses will, if worn, cure a large variety of headaches and overcome many distressing nervous states.

The dull student at school, can sometimes be transformed into the brilliant prize winner through the use of glasses. Headaches are forgotten and the natural youngster is shown as a combination of student and playfellow.

Periodic yearly eye examinations of the child student who is wearing glasses are wise and insurance that pays big dividends in balanced health.

Later in life, most often beginning about the age of forty, even persons who have never known headaches or irritable nerves, find that they fall asleep reading the evening paper after the day's work is done. The Sunday morning

headache often becomes the established reason for neglecting church attendance. The regular out door man finds his golf game more and more uncertain and his medal score becomes higher and higher. Golf is then, no longer a recreation, for a poor game breeds weariness and dissatisfaction.

Both these classes of persons find Sunday a restless day instead of a rest day. Blue Monday follows.

The cure of these woes of ill health is oftentimes the use of so called presbyopic glasses for reading and constant glasses for the correction of refractive errors manifest with the advent of old age's youth which is forty. It has been said "Forty is the old age of youth and the youth of old age."

All persons at the age of forty should submit to eye examinations even if glasses have never been used, and periodically every year or two thereafter. Forty is a critical age and glasses are frequently of greater value than drugs in preserving balanced health.

Failure to relieve headache or nervous states through the use of glasses readers general physical examination essential. In children, asthenia and diseased tonsils may be the factors requiring attention.

In adults the use of glasses, failing to relieve symptoms, suggests need for general physical examination with special consideration to the factors leading to high blood pressure or disease of the kidneys.
