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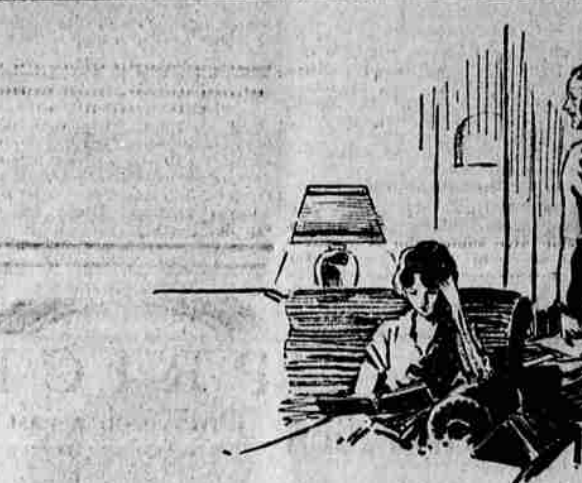

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Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary) Breakfast—Stewed figs with lemon, cereal, thin cream, plain muflets, bran muffins, milk, coffee. Luncheon—Scalloped rice, lettuce sandwiches, jolly roll cake, milk, tea.

Dinner—Baked ham and pineapple, baked potatoes, creamed spinach, head lettuce with chiffonade dressing, graham bread, sponge cake with fresh strawberries, milk, coffee.

Of course a separate meat must be provided for small children in place of the ham suggested for the dinner menu. A lamb chop, beef patty or lamb patty can be easily and quickly broiled for them.

However, the ham and pineapple dish is so very much worth while for a company luncheon, or dinner that the recipe follows.

Baked Ham and Pineapple

One slice of ham cut 2 to 3 inches thick, fresh pineapple, 1/2 cup brown sugar, 12 whole cloves, one half cup water.

If preferred 2 slices of ham, each cut 1 inch thick can be used. Cut out the bone and trim edges of ham. Cut pineapple in half-inch slices. Pare and remove eyes and cores.

Put into an earthenware mixing bowl, sprinkle with sugar and place in a warm place for an hour to draw out the juice. When ready to use drain from juice and stick with cloves. Put ham into dripping pan or roaster. Cover with

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slices of pineapple and strew the fruit with bits of the fat, trimmed from the ham. Add water to pineapple juice and pour over ham. Cover and bake 1 1/2 hours in a moderate oven. Remove cover and brown pineapple. If a self-heating roaster is not used the ham and fruit must be broiled while baking. Serve on a platter using the ham and garnishing the dish with sprigs of crisp watercress.
