

SEARCH TURNS TO THE SOUTH

LOS ANGELES, May 26, (AP)—

Attention in the Alvin Karpis case shifted today to the Mexican border after it was learned by newspapermen last night that an El Paso, Texas, deputy sheriff and two federal operatives have been checking for the last two days on a tip that the missing evangelist and another woman crossed the border of El Paso several days ago.

According to information obtained by the newspapers, border officers noticed that two women crossing the border recently in a car from California one of them closely resembling descriptions of the missing evangelist. Deputy Sheriff John Hargrove of El Paso who was in Los Angeles at the time of another case, was ordered by his chief to make an investigation. A license plate number furnished him is said to have revealed that the car registered in the name of a person known by Mrs. Alvin Karpis.

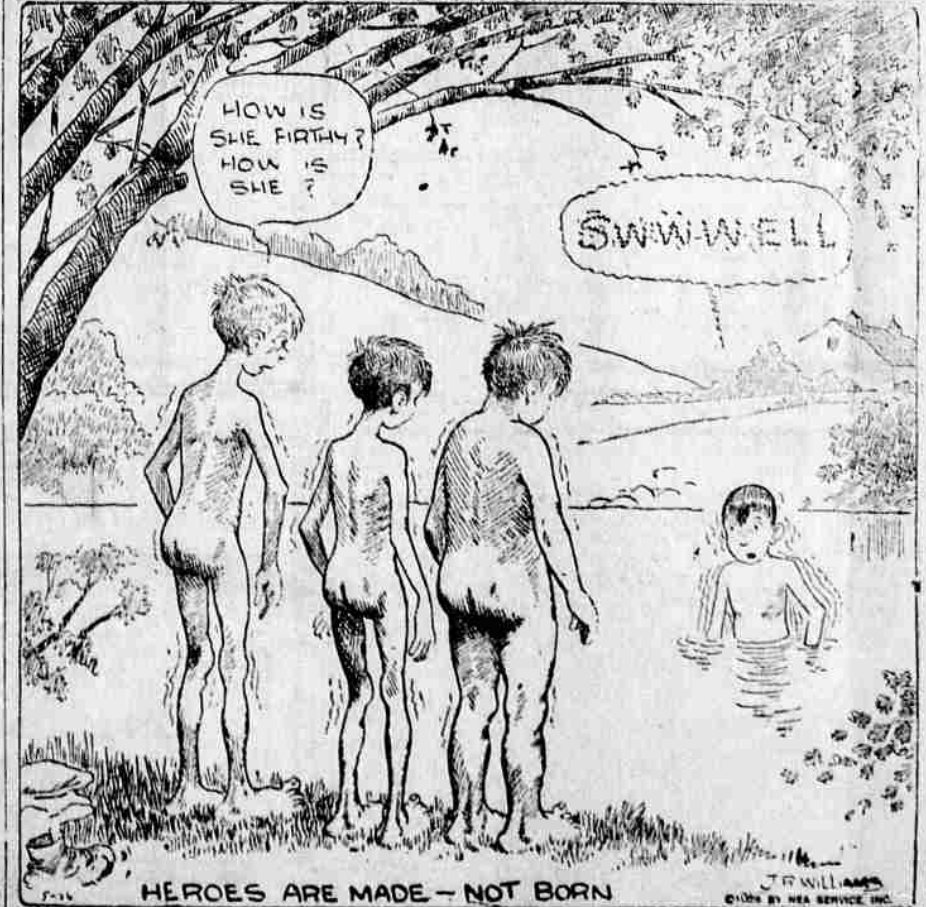
