PORTLAND, Ore., May 26, (AP)—Complete reports from all counties in the republican campaign in last Friday's primary were tabulated today by The Associated Press. The returns on the democratic candidates were complete except for one precinct in Ika-chuka county.

Turner Takes Lead
Final totals, which included official figures from eleven of the thirty-five counties, showed no change except in the very close races between L. R. Turner of Dallas and J. O. McLaughlin of Corvallis, for the democratic nomination for superintendent of public instruction. Turner, snatched the lead which was held yesterday by McLaughlin. The latest figures, with one Deschutes precinct missing were: Turner 14,782; McLaughlin 14,747, a lead of 35 for Turner.

Bert E. Haney's majority over Elton Watkins, for the democratic nomination of U. S. senator was 2,212. The figures were: Haney 17,671; Watkins 15,459.

Complete returns for the republican nomination for U. S. senator were: Frederick Stidwer 48,182; Senator R. N. Stanfield 24,441; A. E. Clark 21,288; L. B. Sandblast 14,766; J. J. Crowley 9,669; A. R. Shumway 5,825; Rome E. Barrett 3,238; C. E. Evey 1,957.

L. L. Patterson received a total of 62,657 for the republican nomination for governor; Jay H. Upton 28,634; W. A. Carter 21,374.

Governor Walter M. Pierce received 23,441 for the democratic nomination for governor. His opponent Louie Palmer Welch polled 9,760.

For the republican nomination for superintendent of public instruction the final figures were: Chas. A. Howard 45,265; W. C. Anderson 21,154; F. J. Toomey 16,939; Miss Rosa B. Parrott 15,619; Mrs. Emma Bryant 11,338.

For democratic national committee 1,846 precincts gave former Governor West 12,502; Milton A. Miller 12,486; Will R. King 6,435.

WHEAT JUMPS; MAY IN LEAD

CHICAGO, May 26, (AP)—Wheat prices scored a sharp advance today with May in the lead and with general covering on the part of shorts. May delivery went to around 29 1/2c over July, the widest premium yet this season. Complaints of lack of moisture in the American northwest and also in parts of the domestic winter crop belt accelerated the advance which was primarily due to scantiness of immediate wheat supplies in Chicago.

Wheat closed nervous 1/2 to 5/8c net higher, corn unchanged to 1/8c off; oats unchanged to 1/8c up and provisions at 7 to 20c gain.

TESTIMONY ENDED IN "TUB" TRIAL

Jury that no liquor was served at the party. On the contrary, he said, Miss Hawley had come to him and offered to give any testimony desired if she was paid for it. She threatened, he said, to give testimony detrimental to Carroll if she was not paid.

Under cross examination by U. S. Attorney Buckner, Scaife testified that he had charge of the bath tub and that he had filled it about six times during the evening. He said he had not taken a single drink from it himself.

Tells of "Threats"
The treasurer and assistant treasurer of the Earl Carroll theater testified that they had heard Miss Hawley make what they considered veiled threats that she would give adverse grand jury testimony unless she was given what she wanted.

Testimony in the perjury trial of Earl Carroll in connection with grand jury investigation of his bath tub party, ended early this afternoon when the defense rested. The government rested its case yesterday.

Among the eight defense witnesses called today was Al Johnson, blackfaced comedian, who said that he had known Carroll a long time and that his reputation for truth was excellent.

Johnson testified—merely—as a character witness not having been a guest at the bath tub party.
