

INQUIRY WILL BE POSTPONED

LOS ANGELES, May 27, (AP)—The district attorney's investigation which was to have opened today into the strange disappearance of Almee Sempie McPherson, the evangelist, seemed likely to be postponed until next week.

While District Attorney Ana Keyes said yesterday that he would start a complete investigation if Mrs. McPherson's body was not recovered in the meantime, he announced later that he would withhold action until the first or next week allowing ample time for the body to be cast up by the ocean.

Mrs. McPherson disappeared ten days ago while sunbathing at Ocean Park but it has never been definitely established that she drowned.

Interest in Keyes' delaying into the case is expected to center around the attempt to locate Kenneth G. Orniston, formerly radio operator at Mrs. McPherson's church, Angelus temple, Orniston and efforts to find him have been futile. He was last heard of at Santa Monica, a beach city near where the evangelist was last seen.

It was indicated that officers propose to question the radio man in an effort to develop a lead supporting any one of numerous theories advanced as an explanation of the pastor's disappearance.

Keyes indicated that his office will question all others who have been connected in any way with the case, including the evangelist's mother, Mrs. Minnie Kennedy, and Miss Emma Schaffer, Mrs. McPherson's secretary, who reported the disappearance.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 27 (AP)—The Chronicle says Kenneth G. Orniston, former radio operator for Almee Sempie McPherson, who mysteriously disappeared from Los Angeles, was in San Francisco Tuesday to obtain a California license for his automobile.

W. G. Orniston, the radio operator's father, denied all knowledge of his son's whereabouts. Orniston passed through San Francisco, May 12 on his way from Los An-

glees, the elder Orniston said, but asserted he had not seen his son since.

"Kenneth told us he visited Mrs. McPherson when he was in Los Angeles on that trip," W. W. Orniston said. "If he was here to-day he was travelling through either to Los Angeles or Seattle."

The former radio operator was recently an auto salesman in Seattle, it was said. He was divorced from his wife shortly after Mrs. McPherson left for her European trip last winter, the elder Orniston said.

And I do hereby further proclaim that at said special City Election held in said city on the 21st day of May, 1926, at which said election was submitted by the Commission of the City of La Grande the following question for their adoption or rejection the ballot title of which is as follows:

SUBMITTED BY THE CITY COMMISSION

Shall the Charter of the City of La Grande, Oregon, be amended so as to provide for five members of the City Commission instead of three; four to be elected from wards to be determined later and one to be elected at large from the city.

There were cast for ballot No. 502 Yes—553 votes; there were cast for ballot No. 503 No—475 votes; majority in favor of question—78 votes.

I do hereby further proclaim that such aforesaid amendment and question submitted, have been duly adopted by the legal voters of said city.

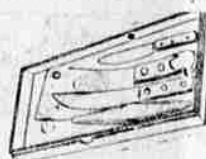
