

Marble, Lime Company Plans For Development

Enterprise Firm to Construct Four Kilns and Hydrating Plant in the Near Future.

ENTERPRISE, Ore., May 28.—After several months of investigation, officers of the Black Marble and Lime company Tuesday night announced their development plans at a meeting of the Enterprise Chamber of Commerce. In brief, these include the following:

Emphasis on lime production, this seeming to be the most profitable field.

Immediate construction of four kilns and a hydrating plant on the railroad track at Enterprise.

Construction of an aerial tramway from the quarry to this plant to bring down the rock.

In carrying out this program, of tremendous significance to the community, the company asks some local assistance. The cham-

ber of commerce has been asked to aid in procuring the site for the plant and the right of way for the tram, and also to boost the company's financial plans. At the Tuesday night meeting the chamber voted hearty approval of the company's development plans and pledged earnest cooperation in all ways.

Will Be Great Asset
The meeting was called for the purpose of hearing from officers of the marble company, and as they spoke they unfolded an interesting story of their investigations into the possibilities of the rock. They showed how the quarry will become one of the country's chief assets and for untold years to come will bring in a steady flow of wealth.

H. J. Kressly, called on first, said he and his associates came from Lewiston, Idaho, seeking merely a fine black rock to use in composition with other building materials. They had various tests and analyses made of the black marble and

those suggested a steadily widening field of use; marble for building, lime for building purposes and for use in many manufacturing lines, also for fertilizer. As the investigations proceeded, the men came to realize that their original plans must be abandoned as to small and absurdly inadequate to the great possibilities of the business.

Lime Considered First
Continuing their study for six months or more, they gradually had to come to the conclusion that the greatest possibilities of the quarry were in its lime, and that this should be pushed on a large scale. In the spring the old kiln at the quarry was opened and has been in steady operation ever since, burning lime which has been widely distributed for demonstration and tests. Then W. D. Demorest was induced to come here to investigate the quarry and to make further tests of the lime both in laboratory and in actual use. He has had many years experience with the largest concerns in the country.

As one experiment Mr. Demorest had a carload of lime, with its origin wholly concealed, shipped to Portland where he sold it out in small lots to several prominent builders. He told the meeting that every contractor receiving the lime

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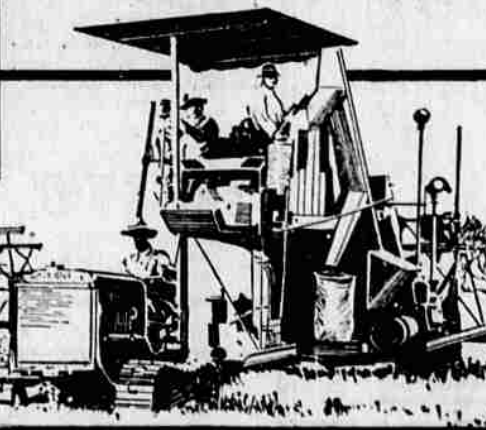
