WASHINGTON, May 28. ## CHEMIST IS TAKEN AS POISONER

KANSAS CITY, May 28. (AP)—Alva Estabrook, arrested in Denver today in connection with an alleged poison plot against Judge E. E. Porterfield, of the circuit court, was formerly chief flour inspector for the Kansas City board of trade. He and his wife had been estranged since 1924 and this spring Mrs. Estabrook obtained a divorce, naming Miss Irlia Roberts, former employe in her husband's office, as corespondent.

Investigation of the alleged plot, following discovery that the package of pancake flour received at the judge's home by mail contained poison, led to Estabrook when Judge Porterfield told the authorities Estabrook had written threatening letters to him from Denver. The letters referred to earlier domestic troubles, in which Judge Porterfield had rendered a decision.
