

# FARMERS HANG TWO IN EFFIGY

SCOTT BLUFF, Neb., May 28. (AP)—Dr. Hubert Work, secretary of the interior, and Dr. Elwood Mead, commissioner of reclamation, were hanged in effigy here last night by an angry group of farmers and citizens who blamed them for failure of the government to supply the irrigated North Platte valley with needed water from the government project.

One of the effigies had but one arm with a sign "Dr. Elwood Mead" attached to it. Mead has but one arm. The other effigy was marked "Dr. Work." This sign was found on that effigy:

"For breaking his word and depriving a project of water."

The hanging of the effigies is the first intimation of violence or drastic action since the trouble over water started but those concerned with the situation fear that unless relief is extended soon, the farmers may attempt to forcibly gain control of the lateral gates of the vast irrigation system and read water to their dry crops.
